Breaking the Drought!



Tēnā koutou, e te whānau o Mount Albert Grammar School.

In March 1936, MAGS Woodwork Teacher Jack Jenkin brought together a squad of 16 MAGS boys to form the first Auckland schoolboy rowing crew.

Over the years that followed, MAGS stamped its mark on the Auckland schools' rowing scene, including in 1947 when our Senior Eight brought the Maadi Cup back to MAGS as inaugural national champions (beating Sacred Heart College by half a boat-length).

As an aside, Jack Jenkin used his skills to fashion a wooden base for the Maadi Cup (pcitured) which is still part of the trophy today!

The golden era of MAGS rowing continued right through until 1961 – the last time a MAGS crew won Gold at the Maadi Cup. Fast forward 60 years and a MAGS crew has once again returned triumphant to the podium at the national tournament.

Last week, Nick Bryan and Cameron MacGillivray (pictured above with Director of Rowing Alice Denyer) rowing in the U17 Coxless Pair Oars, left competitors in their wake as they claimed MAGS first national rowing title in six decades.

First Maadi Cup Gold in 60 years

MAGSROW has secured its first Gold medal at the Maadi Cup since 1961, with Nick Bryan and Cam MacGillivray winning the A Final boys U17 Coxless Pair Oars lasr weekend with a flawless row at Lake Karapiro against tough competition from around the country. The MAGSROW squad also secured two Bronze medals with Ava Paynter and Kate Grubi (pictured left) coming third in the A Final Girls U17 Coxless Pair Oars, and the novice boys



crew – Max Jarvie, Luke Sanders, Fraser MacGillivray, Charlie Heath and cox Max Murphy – placing third in the A Final of the Boys U15 Coxed Four.

Overall, the crews successfully qualified for eight A Finals and nine B Finals – breaking the previous MAGSRow record. Securing a place in these finals shows these crews are among the top secondary school rowers in the country. The 2021 Aon Maadi Cup attracted more than 2000 competitors from 120 New Zealand schools.

Director of Rowing Alice Denyer says the Maadi Cup squad of 51 rowers (Year 10 – Year 13) worked incredibly hard over

the season and were well-prepared going into this national event.

"Our coaches are so proud of what the squad achieved. Over the past few years we've seen our MAGSRow crews getting stronger each year and this year saw another big step up in our performance," she said.

"It was great to see some of our senior crews winning medals and making it into finals, and it's also very exciting to have strong novice rowers in the squad."

Relay for Life at almost \$80,000



Relay for Life last weekend was a huge success with 264 students taking part and raising almost \$80,000 after completing 17,839 of the Lovelock Track during the 14-hour event. Since MAGS began taking part in the event in 2014, our school has raised more than \$500,000 for the Cancer Society. That is an incredible effort, helped in no small part by the tireless organisation of TIC Ms Pulham ([pictured below right).

Ms Pulham said there were some very sore and tired students at school this week after they covered 7700km between them from 6pm Saturday to 8am Sunday.

Forty five groups of students brought tents along this year so there was a small tent city in the MAGS area.

Ms Pulham said, "The security guy at the gate was surprised by the number of MAGS students; he said he ended up just asking each kid walking past if they were MAGS and

pointing them to our spot."

She added, "Students had the chance to reflect and remember family and friends who they have lost to cancer during our lap in silence. It really showed the support the students gave to each other during a difficult lap seeing students support one another. Many students created a candle bag, which they personalised to people who they had lost. These bags lit up the track as we walked throughout the night around the track."

There were also 25 teachers who came out to support the students and help out




over the course of the night. Many of the teachers had zero sleep and ran some significant amounts of laps alongside the students. Students also enjoyed the silent disco from 1am to 3am that kept them awake and also avoided disrupting the neighbours

Ms Pulham said, "There were lots of students keen to help the teachers pack down and tidy up our area despite a sleepless night and 14 hours of walking. The tired teachers really appreciated the support and yet again it reminded us of what a great school we work at."

Next Saturday, April 10, MAGS will be competing in the Auckland Central Sheilah Winn Shakespeare Festival at Diocesan School.

Our students are excited to perform the 15-minute and 5-minute scenes from Shakespeare's canon. It is an excellent opportunity for them to develop their skills both onstage and backstage as well as express themselves creatively. This year we have three student-directed scenes alongside the teacher-directed scene.

Jasper Cameron is directing Act 1 Scene 3 from *The Merchant of Venice*. The scene takes place in a restaurant that is a front for a criminal network during Prohibition Era New York. He has authentic costuming and a live band to create the seedy atmosphere.

Camille Peterson has chosen to interpret the Gravedigger scene from *Hamlet*. She has given it a post-apocalyptic aesthetic, examining the status of the characters through this return to feudalism.

Ruby Wilson and Nikitha Chinthalacheruvu are co-directing a collection of scenes from *King Lear*. It has a traditional setting but they have dual cast the titular character to emphasise his descent into madness.

Finally, HOD Drama Mr Urquhart is directing Act 1 Scene 1 from *Much Ado About Nothing*. Soldiers are welcomed back from the front. Love blossoms and rivalries resume.

The festival runs on both Friday, 9 April and Saturday, 10 April, with MAGS presenting from 10.15am on the Saturday.

Interact fundraised by going around form classes selling lolly bags and raffle tickets, exchanging stickers for donations, and holding a barbecue and a bake sale.


Over 100 students participated in these efforts on behalf of Interact and many more

Inspirational mural for Science Block



Over the past few months, Ullrich Von Reiche, Dasha Leonhartsberger, Elka Aitchison and Lucy Woodall have been working collaboratively on a mural to highlight the different areas of science taught at MAGS.

The group planned and painted using their different styles, creating a work that will be displayed in CS block later this year.

The brief for the painting was to show how science helps to demystify the world around us and to show the tension between what we see, what we have discovered and what we have yet to discover.

Ullrich said, "The piece starts on the outside and moves methodically from large physical objects to show the unpacking of the mysteries contained within them. Even science has its limits though, represented by the large black eclipse in the middle symbolising the hint of what we cannot yet see."

Sports Update

Medals galore at AKSS Athletics

Twenty nine students represented MAGS at the Auckland Secondary School Athletics Championships on Tuesday at Mount Smart Stadium.

Our students performed exceptionally well in wet and windy conditions for the first part of the day. Overall, MAGS students won 18 medals at the meet.



Gezreyal Maiu'u won three events – the Junior Girls 200m, Junior Girls 70m Hurdles, the 300m Junior Girls Hurdles – and came second in the Junior Girls Triple Jump.

In the process, she set two school records: in the 300m Junior Girls Hurdles, with a time of 42.76 seconds (eclipsing the record of 48.12 seconds set by Amelia Caltaux in 2018), and she broke the Junior Girls Triple Jump record by 30cm with a jump of 10.10m. The previous record had been standing since

2008, and was set by Natalie Booth.

A special mention goes to Benjie Fairclough, who broke an Auckland Secondary Schools Championship meet record with a time of 45.44 seconds in winning the Junior Boys 300m Hurdles. This may also be a school record as well. Previously there had been no time recorded for this event.

The 4x100m Junior Girls relay team (Gezreyal Maiu'u, Tommee Paeu, Nina Chalmers and Ella De Coek) won Gold and beat the record they set at the zone meet two weeks ago with a time of 53.20 seconds.

The Senior Boys 4x400m relay team of Shay Russek, Luke Clements, Eamon Buick and Troy Middleton also won – in a close race – and surpassed a record set in 2016 by 10 seconds with a time of 3:34.26.

Sylvia Brunt threw 12.72m in coming second in the Senior Girls Shot Put to beat a record set by Yoko Tsukushi last year by 28cm.

Gold medals were also won by Tommee Paeu (Junior Girls Long Jump), Troy Middleton (Senior Boys 200m) and Luke Clements (Senior Boys Steeplechase 2000m).
