
Remembering Mary Kerrigan

Pacific Climate Warriors urge action



The Environment Committee invited the Pacific Climate Warriors to talk to students at Tuesday lunchtime.

The Pacific Climate Warriors are a youth-led Pacific network who spread awareness around climate change and work within Pacific communities to take action.

They gave a talk to our students on the important work they do to fight climate change in the Pacific, including political action.

They educated students on the importance of being aware of the disproportionate impacts on indigenous peoples in the Pacific, as well as across the globe.

Survival of the fittest



As part of this term's 12 Outdoor Education unit on Bushcraft, students went on an outdoor overnight survival training course run by SOS Survival, who have a military background and work at a base near Muriwai.

The course focused on the essentials of survival: protection, location, water and food, and gave the students a practical insight into some basic survival skills.

During the course the students started by learning about the basic principles of survival, followed by some basic knots used for a variety of purposes. They then learned how to build a natural shelter to sleep in and developed fire lighting skills in the bush. They then had to cook on their fire and maintain it overnight for warmth as well as sleep in the shelter they had made.

Mr Belson said, "It was an awesome experience with lots of learning in a practical environment as well as ensuring that what you did, did not not have poor outcomes. "Well done to all 120E students who took part in this experience."

A host is expected to provide a clean and comfortable bedroom with bed, wardrobe (builtin or free-standing) and drawers, linen and towels, desk and lamp, heating in room, three meals a day plus snacks and laundry. We prefer our students to be placed within a 20minute commute of school

What is the benefit of hosting?

• A chance to meet students from all over the world.

An opportunity for your children to learn a different language and build an international friend network. We have many families who have visited or sent their children to stay with their past homestay students overseas.
Prompt fortnightly payment of \$640 (\$320 per week).

The Hockey Boys 1st XI finished their A1 season in second place. The Hockey Girls 1st XI finished sixth after their playoff against Macleans College.


After their playoff against EGGS, the Football Girls 1st XI finished 4th for the season. The Football Boys 1st XI finished fifth in their competition
