John Puiatau Pule ONZM (1974-1975) – Accepted on behalf by Greg Moyle For services to art and literature


Stanley Arthur Palmer ONZM (1950-1953) For services to painting and printmaking

Rosarina, who is studying Medicine at University of Auckland, said she never regretted taking on two Scholarship papers despite the challenges involved with that.

She sat Scholarship Biology and English, gaining a Scholarship in Biology. She has since completed a double degree – a Bachelor of Science and a Bachelor of Health Science – and is now in her second year at Medical School.

Rosarina said students should test their capabilities by taking on Scholarship exams, which were great preparation for further studies, and push themselves to see what they could achieve.

LEAPS & BOUNDS ACTIVATE


A 8 day course for physically disabled youth (13-16yrs) to attend with a parent or caregiver. Sun 7 - Sun 14 April 2024

Out-of-zone enrolments for 2024

The Mount Albert Grammar School Board of Trustees may approve a limited number of out-of-zone enrolments for 2024.

Applications for out-of-zone enrolments for 2024 must be received by 4.00pm, Wednesday, 30 August, 2023. Should a ballot be required for out-of-zone enrolments, this will occur on Wednesday, 6 September, 2023.

Out-of-zone applications use the same online application procedure as in-zone students. However, out-of-zone applications do not require the completion of the in-zone Statutory Declaration Form or provision of proof of residence.
