**Boys crowned National Squash Champions**

MAGS Premier Boys Squash team made history when they won the NZ Secondary Schools Squash Championships for our school for the first time last weekend in Tauranga. MAGS beat Tauranga Boys College 3-1 in the final, only losing one match out of the 24 they played against five schools over the weekend. The boys are on a roll, having recently won the Auckland title.

The secondary schools national squash champs has been held since the mid-1980s, and about nine years ago the MAGS Boys got close when they lost 3-2 in the final against Auckland Grammar. Michael Blanchard was part of that team and has returned to coach the boys along with Julian Conder, who is also the manager.



Following the tournament, three MAGS players were selected for the New Zealand team to play a test against Australia.

Congratulations to Tarin Love (above right) and Jack Conder (above left, non-travelling reserve), who were picked for the Senior Boys team, and to Mason Smales (above centre), who will play for the Junior Boys.

New Zealand takes on Australia from August 19-23 at the Devoy Squash & Fitness Centre in Tauranga – the same venue at which the NZSS Championships were held.

Yesterday, 103 Year 12 Geography students braved the cold and wet to study fluvial processes along the Puhoi River as part of their internal assessment coursework. Students measured and constructed stream bed profiles, measured water velocity and turbidity, and collected sediment samples at three different locations along the upper, middle and lower courses of the river.

MAGS Geography students enjoyed this exciting opportunity to experience hands-on learning in the real world.

### **Work on Roy Clements Treeway**

Students who use the Roy Clements Treeway to or from school are advised that Watercare has scheduled geotechnical work along the walkway for a week from next Thursday (August 15).

During that time, the pedestrian walkway will remain open but with minor diversions in place. Please take care when walking in the area.

The geotechnical investigations are part of Watercare's Central Interceptor project to build a super-sized wastewater tunnel that will significantly reduce overflows in central Auckland, improving the health of local waterways.

Football Girls 1st XI 'keeper Alisha Perry has been named in the NZ U19 Football team to compete at the Oceania Football Championships in the Cook Islands.

New Zealand, who have won the title six times, head to the Cook Islands as defending champions and favourites for the OFC U19 Championship.

The tournament takes place from August 29 to September 14 with New Zealand being drawn in Group B with Samoa, American Samoa and Tahiti.

The winner of the tournament qualifies for the 2020 U20 Women's World Cup in Nigeria.
