The recently released 2021 NCEA and New Zealand Scholarship results have been greeted with much celebration by the school.

Despite the significant disruptions across last year, our senior students have

triumphed, producing academic results that place us alongside the best schools in the country.

The 104 NZ Scholarships awarded to MAGS students place us in the top 5 schools nationally. Included are two Top Scholar Subject Awards (Matthew Batcheler – Technology, and Marcus Savelio – Dance). Matthew also received an Outstanding Scholar Award along with Year 12 student Deboprana Mallick.

As we launch our Centenary, these achievements remind us of our core business as a school – and the reason MAGS was established 100 years ago deliberately as a grammar school.

Outstanding Scholarship results







Congratulations to Deboprana Mallick and Matthew Batcheler (pictured above, left and right, respectively), who were named Outstanding Scholars when the awards from the 2021 NZ Scholarship exams were announced today.

Matthew was also named the Top Scholar in NZ in Technology as was Marcus Savelio (above centre) in Dance. It is the second year in a row that MAGS has had the Top Scholar in Dance in NZ after Bethany Fletcher won that award in the 2020 exams.

These are fantastic achievements in a challenging year, when MAGS students gained some incredible academic results, with 104 Scholarships, including 11 at Outstanding level, in the 2021 NZ Scholarship exams.




Science, Physics, Statistics and Calculus). Deboprana Mallick – as a Year 12 – gained three scholarships (Calculus [0], Statistics [0] and Physics).

The other students who gained three or more scholarships, and will have their names inscribed on our Honours Board, are Angus Edwards (Calculus, History, Statistics), Rahul Hendriksen (English, History, Media Studies) and Ella Vuetilovoni (Biology, Media Studies, Statistics).

Outstanding Scholarships were also gained by Melissa Barnes (Biology), Samara Brain (Dance), Chloe Innes (Photography), Felicity Marsh (Media Studies), Abigail Miller (Statistics) and Vivienne Hei Man Wong (Statistics).

Outstanding Scholar Awards are worth \$5000 per year for up to three years for tertiary study, Scholarship Awards (three or more Scholarships in the same year) and Top Scholar Awards are worth \$2000 a year for up to three years for tertiary study.




Postponed 2021 prize-givings

100 years ago today



MAGS opened in February 1922, with building work still going on into winter.

The main building, as pictured above in 1922, was complete as far as A6 and B6, with the Science wing (at right rear) still under construction.

Only two other buildings were complete as school started: the shelter shed and toilet block (at the rear of the Science wing) and the caretaker's cottage at the main gate

In 1922 there were nine forms: 5A and 5B; 4A, 4B and 4C; 3A, Junior 3A (for bright boys under 13 years old), 3B Latin and Commercial 3B (where Bookkeeping was taught instead

With the start of the new school year, and as we settle into both our curricular and cocurricular activities, questions arise regarding current vaccine requirements and expectation for students. The following information may offer some clarity for those who have any queries.

SCHOOL SPORT:



Students wishing to participate in school sport must be vaccinated as per the information below copied from the College Sport Bylaws:

4.5 Participating Schools must ensure that their representatives in College Sport Auckland Competitions (individual or team) are fully vaccinated.

4.6 To be fully vaccinated a person must have received all of the doses of a COVID-19 vaccine or combination of COVID-19 vaccines, administered in accordance with the requirements specified for that vaccine or combination of vaccines, as set out in Schedule 3 of

the COVID-19 Public Health Response (Vaccinations) Order 2021.1

This ruling applies to all students wishing to participate in sport and represent the school. Naturally, this also applies to all students who are in any of the MAGS sports academies because one of the conditions of inclusion in an academy is to represent the school in the academy code. Simply put, to represent the school in sport or participate in one of the academies, students must be vaccinated.

Note: It is important to realise the **difference** between sport/academy participation requirements and Physical Education (PE) participation requirements.

Physical Education (PE) is a subject that is part of the New Zealand curriculum and under the legislation passed by the government 'Schools are prohibited from requiring students to be vaccinated to access <u>education</u>.'

Sport at schools is not compulsory and not part of the curriculum and is therefore a cocurricular activity. The MoE has worked with Sport NZ, and co-curricular activities follow the <u>Sport NZ</u> guidelines. This means that we are able to continue playing if we follow the protocols published by them on their <u>website</u>

EDUCATION OUTSIDE THE CLASSROOM - EOTC:

Parents of students taking Outdoor Education will be aware that students participate in numerous activities that involve using an out of school EOTC provider/service.

Many parents may also be aware that from February 4th, EOTC providers are "now also able to provide curriculum-based activities to schools without requiring all children to be vaccinated". However, it must be emphasised that while providers are 'now also able' this is not a mandate and to be able to do so requires the EOTC provider to "meet a range of requirements".

It is safe to say that while some providers may take this step, others may not because it is their choice. The only way entry for students to be guaranteed to EOTC providers and facilities is if students are vaccinated and have a Vaccine Pass.

In summary, the information above explains the expectations and rulings for participation in Sport and EOTC, and the difference with PE. These expectations and rulings are set for all schools by the Ministry of Education and Sport New Zealand.
