


Students were then organised into Mentor Classes before beginning their orientation with the help of our Peer Support team.

100 Years ago today



In 1922 there were 11 Assistant Masters to Headmaster FW Gamble when MAGS opened, with an official student roll of 291 boys.

In 1932 the number had risen to 25 Assistant Masters with AR Gatland as Second Master

and in Charge of Mathematics.

Science, English, Latin and French all had senior staff in charge of those four subjects.

In 1942 there were 32 Assistant Masters, and W Caradus was Second Master. Seven masters were on leave in the armed services during World War II.

Today, in our Centenary Celebrations year, MAGS has about 210 teaching staff (plus 70 support staff) and a roll of 3100 (boys and girls).

MAGS mourns loss of Soren Wislang



MAGS started the year mourning the loss of Mathematics teacher Soren Wislang, who died suddenly during the school holidays.

Soren had been with us for four years and made a huge impact during that time.

Headmaster Mr Drumm, who spoke at Soren's memorial service along with Soren's colleague Mr Walden, said: "As we know, the culture of our school rests upon our four pillars – Academic, The Arts, Sport and Service. And Soren was one of our very special colleagues who invested in students through every one of those MAGS Pillars.



"First and foremost, Soren was unquestionably an outstanding teacher – an expert in the teaching of Mathematics and particularly Statistics. His reputation went way beyond his own students. They loved being in his class because they knew they were going to be well looked after, the expectations were going to be high – and that *Mr Wislang* would make sure they were successful!

"And the best possible accolade we can ever get in our profession... students referred to him as a *great* teacher!

"And then there was Soren the mentor.

"He loved our burgeoning choral programme and supported the Centennial Choir as a double bass player. He helped with our orchestras and travelled to Melbourne with them in those good old days when that was possible. And he played electric bass in MAGnitude – our staff band.

"Being an expert teacher and then supporting our Performing Arts programmes wasn't enough for Soren. He somehow found time to coach and manage both winter and summer sports – Tennis, Table Tennis and Football."

"Soren's legacy is one of generosity and service to the people of MAGS. And especially to the many hundreds of students who were lucky enough to be taught, mentored or coached by him – both at MAGS and at Rangitoto College.

"We thank Soren's wife Diana, his daughters Hannah and Kate for loaning their husband

Prefects Camp builds tight team



Our Prefects Camp, held late last month, saw 57 Prefects go through an intensive but fun-filled three days and nights based at School House.

Prefects engaged in workshops and physical activities aimed at stretching and challenging them so they could build a highly supportive team that could lead with a vision. The were also tasked with understanding leadership styles, dealing with difficult scenarios, looking after mental health, and presenting solutions to problems thrown up by the pandemic. Keep up to date with the MAGS app – free from the App Store or Google Play.

Search for "SchoolAppsNZ", and load the app on to your phone.

You can then search for and add as many schools as you want so you can receive alerts from multiple schools.

MAGS parents can access school newsletters (under 'Links'), Daily Notices, the Kamar portal, teachers' contact details, and notify the school about absences.

If you are using the app to notify the school about



absences, please load and use the child's Student ID Number as this helps to log absences more effectively.

On the app, parents and students can check the School Calendar and sync events with their own calendars, and choose groups about which they wish to receive alerts.

MAGS also has its own <u>Facebook</u>, <u>Instagram</u> and <u>YouTube</u> pages where news, photos and videos about school life are posted.

As advised last year, College Sport Auckland and School Sport NZ are restricting their events and competitions to fully vaccinated participants.


MAGS' Director of Sport Allie Wright said, "So, all competitions where MAGS plays another school require proof of students <u>My Vaccine Pass</u> on registration."



Language assistant job in Paris

Ruby Wilson, a 2021 Year 13 French student at MAGS, is heading off for a year in Paris as a language assistant at Sainte-Croix school, with which MAGS also shares an exchange programme. Ruby, pictured centre in the Paris Metro during an exchange, is our sixth pupil to get the job as English language assistant for a year, sharing a small apartment at the top of the school this year with an Australian and a German assistant. She will help in English classes plus give private lessons for the final year pupils who need extra coaching.

Our former HOD Languages Helen Selaries said, "This assistant opportunity has been a very important reason for the exchange with Sainte-Croix, and I hope it will be sustained in future. There are very



few schools in France which offer such an opportunity, with live-in board and most meals. And, of course, Ruby lived for five weeks with her French host family so she has direct contact with people who will help and support her if necessary."
