

Outstanding academic success

Provisional results from 2018 exams show Mount Albert Grammar School has reinforced its reputation as one of the country's top academic schools, with students gaining a record 114 Scholarships, and NCEA exam rates tracking well above comparable schools. Their success will be celebrated at next week's Scholars Assembly held in the school hall at 12pm.

The 114 scholarships included 11 at Outstanding level (the top 1% in each subject). Scholarships were attained across 21 subjects, and were spread among 60 students, with 13 of them gaining three or more scholarships.

Student absence and leave

Some parents are still not following the correct procedures for notifying student absence and leave, which are outlined below:

Student absence

- Parents must notify the school on the morning of the absence. They may do so in the following ways:
 - By telephone: 09 846 2044 x 8142
 - By email: <u>attendance@mags.school.nz</u>
 - Via the school app: Free to download from the App Store or Google Play. Search for 'Mount Albert Grammar School'
 - By note to the Student Centre
- If a student's absence was not notified on the day they were away, they should bring a note explaining the reason for their absence on the day they return to school.
- The absence note must be delivered to the Student Centre.

Late to School

If a student is going to be late to School, the School should be notified in any of the ways listed above.

The student must visit the Student Centre on arrival at School to receive a Late Pass.
