


The Gala Night is a major part of the fundraising efforts of the weekend and we welcome you to buy a ticket here

Next week, there are four performances of the Year 13 Production, The Government Inspector, by Nikolai Gogol.

It is a comedy of errors. The corrupt officials of a small village get warned that an inspector will be arriving soon to check on the running of things. The only catch being that he will do it...incognito. A young man from the capital has recently arrived in town. He has been refusing to pay his bills, instead charging them to an address in St Petersburg. Could this be the government inspector in disguise?


The Government Inspector is perhaps Russia's most famous comedy. It takes a satirical look at the corruption that exists in power structures and the greed that exists in us all. Playwright Nikolai Gogol was innovative for the early 19th Century in that none of his main

characters were written sympathetically. In fact, all of the characters in this play have their flaws. He encourages the audience to laugh at these outrageous characters and, maybe in the process, to laugh at ourselves.

The show opens 7pm, Monday, August 2, with shows at the same time on the following Wednesday, Thursday and Friday nights.

The event will take place in the FW Gamble Hall starting at 6pm and feature beverages and


canapes, with tickets costing \$60.


Albertians are also encouraged to register at our <u>Albertian Online Community website</u>

Seventy years ago ...

Huge thanks to Albertian Bob Kinnear, who, this week, dropped off the photo below of his fourth form class from 70 years ago.

Mr Kinnear's family has many historical links to the school: his father L.F. Kinnear was a foundation student in 1922 and played in the 1924 1st XV Rugby team that won the first of MAGS' Auckland rugby championships, and his grandfather J.H. Sports Update

Orienteers successfully defend NZ title



MAGS Orienteering Boys team has successfully defended its National Schools title, running out convincing winners in Hawkes Bay last weekend. In complex and difficult, hilly terrain, the Boys won the Top Schools Trophy for overall team and the Premier Points trophy. This is the third time in a row that MAGS has won the Top Schools Trophy, amassing 428 points ahead of Pukekohe High in 2nd on 311.

The Girls equalled their best-ever result from last year, finishing 3rd overall, 40 points ahead of their nearest rivals.

Top results came from James Milne (pictured right), who was National Champion in the Junior Boys category



for both the Long and the Sprint events; and there were top-five performances from Ella Edwards (5th – Long), Daniel Wood (4th – Sprint), Molly McGowan (5th – Sprint). In the Relay, the Intermediate Girls finished 3rd (Ella Edwards, Kate Rogers, Eve Thompson), the Intermediate Boys were 2nd (Oscar Vink, Luka Johnson, Sam Carryer), and the Senior Boys were 3rd (Daniel Wood, Callum Wishart, Tom Aish).
