Rescheduled school events



Postponed because of the COVID-19 lockdown, **Relay for Life** will now take place on Saturday, October 17, at Bruce Pulman Park, Takanini.

Normally an overnighter, the charity event has been shortened to four hours and will run from 3pm to 7pm.

All the money raised goes to the Cancer Society, which provides free nursing, psychology, accommodation, transport and other key services to people in our community affected by cancer.

So far, the MAGS team has raised about \$62,000 – including \$3934 from Mufti Day on March 6 – and is aiming to raise more than \$100,000.

Outdoor Ed rolls along



As part of the 'Discovery 101' and 'Play It Safe' NCEA Assessments for Year 11 Outdoor Education, students went mountainbiking at Woodhill Mountain Bike Park last week.

This was a great first trip back after seven weeks of lockdown. Students were able to develop an understanding of how the body functions, specific to mountainbiking, to assist them with their upcoming biomechanics assessment and identify safe behaviours in an outdoor environment. After the safety briefing, the students started off by completing activities on their bikes to focus on Balance and Stability and Force Summation. This includes looking at the body position on the bike while going uphill/downhill, braking, cornering, cadence and a few fun attempts on the balance structures.

Over three days, the students were able

to ride on various beginner and intermediate tracks with some groups riding 19km in total. At the end, the students, headed back to the carpark with red faces, sore legs and a few bruises but big smiles on their faces.

The app provides core information for Pasifika parents and families to build their knowledge and confidence about education in their own time and in their first language so they can support their children's learning.

Weight of the world

We often use the terms "mass" and "weight" interchangeably in our daily speech, but to an astronomer or a physicist they are completely different things.

The mass of a body is a measure of how much matter it contains. Weight is an entirely different thing. Every object in the universe with mass attracts every other object with mass. The amount of attraction depends on the size of the masses and how far apart they are. For everyday-sized objects, this gravitational pull is vanishingly small, but the pull

between a very large object, like the Earth, and another object, like you, can be easily measured. How? All you have to do is stand on a scale! Scales measure the force of attraction between you and the Earth. This force of attraction between you and the Earth (or any other planet) is called your weight.


Electoral Commission seeking workers

Student Sport Spotlight



Albertian Cole Evans has been named captain of the Black Sox at age 22 and will lead the team at the 2022 Softball World Cup in Auckland.

Cole, who plays shortstop, has already played at three World Cups, winning a silver medal as a 17-year-old at his first senior world championships in 2015, and taking home a gold medal at the 2017 world tournament.

In 2018, Cole and his older brother Rhys were part of the Black Sox's Intercontinental Cup winning team in Prague.

His grandfather, Stu Kinghorn, coached the MAGS Premier Softball Boys to many NZSS titles and was a New Zealand representative himself in 1970.
