
The show must go on



Recently, MAGS sent in their filmed submissions for the Sheilah Winn Shakespeare Festival.

HoD Drama Gerald Urquhart said, "Like everything this year, the lockdown forced changes with this annual event. Ordinarily we would attend a regional festival and perform live.

"This year we submitted filmed entries that preserved the theatricality of the performance. Despite the disruption and challenges, the students performed well and came together as a group. This was in large part due to the leadership from the directors and student leaders Ruby Taylor Sinclair and Cade Stevens. We also had two assistant directors – Yasmin Lakeman and Rose Leader." There were three scenes submitted. Ophelia Sykes and Sarah Norman reinterpreted Lady Macbeth's breakdown as a fracturing of her psyche into three



distinct personalities. They used elements of physical theatre and contemporary dance in

their portrayal of her descent into madness.

David Laxon reimagined *Romeo and Juliet* in a modern context. It echoed the original tragedy of two people being prevented from loving one another, but this time by gender not name.

Finally, Mr Urquhart directed a more traditional take on a scene from As You Like It. The comedy was increased somewhat with the forced inclusion of a socially distanced wrestling match.

Exercising values in sport

On Monday, a workshop was held for Premier Sports Captains and Sports Leaders. The workshop examined 'The MAGS Way' values in a sporting context and was aimed at developing sportspeople who could model the right behaviour and attitudes for their peers.

Director of Sport Allie Wright spoke about the changing face of youth sport and the plans at MAGS to increase participation, develop our young people holistically and live out the school values when we compete.

The guest speaker at the workshop was former MAGS Director of Sport and staff member, and now New Zealand Cricket Players Association CEO Heath Mills (pictured above). Mr Mills was introduced to the audience by MAGS' Director of Cricket Tony Sail, who spoke of Mr Mills' time at MAGS and about his influence in setting up Sports Academies and attracting top class coaches.

Mr Mills talked about how he came to represent and work with cricketers and other

sportspeople. He stressed the importance of being a well-rounded individual, and having interests, education, identity and personal growth outside of sport because there was one certainty about a sporting career: it will end.

He said that on top of planning for a life after sport it was vital for professional sportspeople to remain connected to and supportive of their families and communities because those connections would give them a strong base from which they could forge a new path.

Senior students Luke Clements (pictured), Latonya Lole and Adi Ashok shared their experiences as young sportspeople and the things that drive them to succeed within their sports and in their other areas of interest. Director of Football Peter

Senior Pasifika Evening

This included how Learning Recognition Credits (LRC) will be distributed whilst reinforcing the aims of excellence at MAGS, i.e. aim for the top, not the bare minimum.

The presentation also included information about SchoolPoint and the options within this website that provide assessment data and deadlines.

outlined the significant amount of support options available to our students and celebrated the many teachers who have made themselves available to tutor and support our children on their journey at MAGS.

Inspiration to succeed was provided by Albertians Alyssa Houma (2019 graduate, now Auckland Health Science degree) and Tess Tomokino (2018 graduate, now USA sports scholarship). They spoke about their university experience and showed that success at MAGS opened up future pathways with huge potential.

A Q&A session gave parents and students the chance to clarify any issues, and they were also able to chat casually with staff when light refreshments were served.

Our stream restoration on the ASB MAGS Farm has come a long way since June 2019. We have planted almost 3000 trees, including riparian strips, wetland habitat and native bush. Culvert replacement and daylighting have been completed and we are ready to plant the upper stretch of the stream.

In conjunction with Watercare, Mount Albert Grammar School would love to have members of the MAGS community pitch in to help enhance our stream and learning resource on the farm on Sunday, June 28.

Our amazing planting partner Watercare will be providing food and coffee, and will have plenty of interactive information about the massive Central Interceptor project. We anticipate the day will begin at 10am, with a lunch break at 12pm, and everything packed away by 2.30pm. By no means do we expect everyone to stay for the entire length of time, but we would love to have you plant some trees with us. What to bring:

- Gumboots
- Gloves
- Water bottle

Among those getting their hands dirty on the day will be the MAGS Environment Group (pictured left), which has already been busy planting on the school farm. Enviro Leader Eva Wadsworth said, "The school has 5000 native trees for planting, and around 800 have been planted so far with the help of the environment group and agriculture students. The trees are mainly along the farm stream and, once the trees have grown, will provide a pathway for birds up to Owairaka and a wonderful ecosystem. Students are having a great time getting stuck in, but there's many more trees to go!"



New Director of Aquatics

Mitch comes to us via Belgravia Franklin and the Pukekohe Swim Club, where he has worked as Head Swim Coach. His swimmers have enjoyed success on the national and international stages. Adventures with Outdoor Ed



Earlier this week, Year 12 Outdoor Education students once again experienced the thrill of whitewater kayaking at the Vector Wero Whitewater Park.

This was a great opportunity to put into practice skills learned in our pool. It will also act as a good stepping stone to a trip down the Waikato river later in July.

The main focus of this trip was on risk management and the application of strategies to ensure a safe trip by everyone. Students had identified risks and hazards before participating and are now asked to reflect on the strategies they used to mitigate these risks.

As with all their trips, personal and social responsibility was also a focus.



With the usual Mt Taranaki tramp for Year 13s postponed due to lockdown and then deemed too environmentally risky, it was decided to return to Lake Waikaremoana to tramp the Great Walk over four days.

Day one saw the class meeting outside the school gates at 3.45am to complete a seven-

hour drive to the start of the track and then a five-hour walk to their first hut. The weather remained fine across all four days and although it was cold, not having the rain was a pleasant surprise for a winter tramp, especially when sleeping under a fly shelter on the second night.

The trip provided students with a real life event to devise strategies for a physical activity outcome. Essentially, they had to plan and implement the entire trip themselves using distributed leadership. Everyone did well in their preparation which led to an enjoyable trip.



MAGS Parking Restrictions



Please be aware that Parking Restrictions are in place on the school grounds outside of normal school hours.

The only parking on site available to all supporters, visitors, students, parents and staff are a limited number of MAGS white parks in the top car park and the Blue shared car parks in the bottom car park. Once the parks are full, the school carpark will be closed and only pool patrons will be allowed to enter.

The 24hr tow away parks throughout the car park are enforced at all times, so please leave these free as any unauthorised vehicles will be towed.

Mt Albert Aquatic Centre patrons must have access at all times during the day – and in the bottom car park, <u>the yellow car parks</u> are allocated for pool patrons only.

All cars will need to display their parking pass or pool receipt on their dash to ensure that they are not towed from these council parking spots.

To make sure that you are not disappointed when travelling to watch games at MAGS, we recommend that you park on the surrounding roads and walk to the games via the Alberton

Ave entrances.

We understand the frustrations with parking in Auckland so want to make sure you are prepared when travelling to MAGS sporting events.



Paradoxical thinking

The paradox is that a static, infinitely old universe with an infinite number of stars distributed in an infinitely large space would be bright rather than dark.

This problem is addressed by the fact that the Big Bang theory also involves the expansion of space, which can cause the energy of emitted light to be reduced via redshift. If the assumptions are accepted, then the simplest resolution is that the average luminous lifetime of stars is far too short for light to have yet reached the Earth from very distant stars.



In the context of an expanding universe, it can be argued similarly: the universe is too young for light to have reached the Earth from very distant regions. The first one to address the problem of an infinite number of stars and the resulting heat in the Cosmos was Cosmas Indicopleustes, a Greek monk from Alexandria, who states in his Topographia Christiana: "The crystal-made sky sustains the heat of the Sun, the moon, and the infinite number of stars; otherwise, it would have been full of fire, and it could melt or set on fire."
