Parent-Son Breakfast



Entertainer Pio Terei mixed wit and wisdom in a highly entertaining speech at yesterday morning's Inaugural Parent-Son Breakfast for Year 9 & 13 boys and their families.

He spoke to both sons and parents about keeping the channels of communication open and trying to understand each other's perspective. He emphasised that a rich life did not revolve around material possessions.

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dealing with the grief of losing his youngest son Teina to cancer almost two years ago at age 17.

Albertian Troy Garton (2001-05) spoke about her boxing journey and received her Black Cap from Headmaster Patrick Drumm. Ms Garton also enjoyed seeing her name up on the school's National Sporting Honours Board. She told the assembly how she had won a Bronze despite having ruptured her knee before fighting at the Games on the Gold Coast this year. She is undergoing rehab for the injury but aiming for Gold at the Olympic Games in Tokyo 2020. Mr Mealamu, who has been working with the Rugby 1st XV during pre-season, guizzed students about the MAGS Lion and motto as he told them that nothing worthwhile in life came easy. He said achievement required focus, preparation and clarity.



Funds raised from the show go back into the school, and this is the largest MAGS Foundation fundraising event in the school year.



Chairs last for years



THE GOVERNOR-GENERAL, LORD JELLICOE FORMALLY OPENING THE MOUNT ALBERT GRAMMAR SCHOOL AT AUCKLAND LAST WEEK.

When our archivist Brian Murphy was sent the above photo by Lucy Mackintosh, History Curator at Auckland War Memorial Museum, his eye was caught by the chairs used by the dignitaries at the official opening of MAGS on May 25, 1922. The photo is part of the Sir George Grey Special Collections and shows Headmaster FW Gamble, the Hon George Fowler, a former Minister of Education, Lord Jellicoe, the Governor General in the uniform of an admiral, and Dr E Roberton, vicechairman of the Auckland Grammar School Board.

Because the Governor General is standing, Mr Murphy spotted that he had been sitting on a type of chair of which the school still has seven examples.

Mr Murphy says apart from an unrestored teacher's classroom chair, these seven chairs are the only known original pieces of school furniture.

## Visual Art Winter Workshops



As part of the Visual Art Winter Workshops, visiting artist Michel Tuffery has been busy with art students beautifying the outdoor area beside E3.

Mr Tuffery and his eager helpers are decorating the concrete plinths with a woven star motif. He explained that the multicoloured designs start with a background colour gradient, which is overlaid with a woven star motif stencil, then given some "bling" with paint pens.

Mr Tuffery said students were being encouraged to experiment with colour and also with the different thicknesses of the paint pen nibs to give the designs a lift.



Earlier in the week, and also part of the Winter Workshops, Joon-Hee Park presented to Senior Painting students. She talked about her process of finding and developing a personal style, inspiration for making art works and working as an artist.

Joon-Hee's art is classified as Post Pop Surrealism and has autobiographical elements featuring imagery from memories and dreams. After showcasing her artwork, she did some fun drawing exercises with the students. HoD Visual Art Bryn Corkery said Joon-Hee's passion for art-making was inspirational.

Year 13 Painting student Chantelle Boxall said, "The experience also gave us a lesson where we

could step back and just mess around with ideas. Overall, she was entertaining to listen to and had good tips on how to create meaningful pieces."
