

It is difficult to ignore the tension that exists between the notion of it being a right for all young people to have access to a quality education and the inevitable reality of what this must cost.

No one would counter that our young people deserve a quality education provided by

qualified professionals, but many opinions exist as to what defines a qualified teaching professional. Some would accept a bachelor's degree and teaching diploma – and perhaps a master's? For others this is not so easily measurable.

In your mind's eye, what are your memories? These will be many and varied. No doubt, many will remember their school days kindly ... and others not so.

American poet and educator, Taylor Mali, in his poem <u>What Teachers</u> <u>Make</u>, a response to a dinner party provocation along the lines of "So Mali, what do teachers make?", is emphatic in his claim that in fact what teachers make is 'a difference'.

So, what is it that we want for our children, our students of MAGS? Our school needs to continue to be in a position to provide teaching professionals who want to make a difference. Our young people need those who choose the teaching profession, above all others, because they believe that their contribution to the development of resilient, confident and capable young people is truly valued and not just paid lip service.


#### YOUDANCE YOUTH DANCE FESTIVAL

### Parking restrictions this weekend




With the Football Boys 1st XI and the Rugby 1st XV playing at home tomorrow, the school car park will be closed from 10.30am tomorrow and only pool patrons and team management will have access.

Mount Albert Aquatic Centre patrons must have access at all times during the day – and in the bottom car park, the yellow marked car park spaces are allocated for pool patrons only. All cars will need to display their parking pass or pool receipt on their dash to ensure that they are not towed from these council parking spots. A towing company will be on site to control unauthorised parking.

# **International Food & Culture Evening**




The ever-popular International Food & Culture Evening returns – on Friday, June 28 at 6pm in the F.W. Gamble Hall.
