We've Been Here Before

As we navigate our way through these early stages of 'lockdown' as a school and a country, the word 'unprecedented' is being used by many.

But a chat with former staff members and now MAGS Archivists – Mr Brian Murphy and Mr Greg Cave – confirms that previous generations of MAGS

students have experienced similar disruptions.

Indeed, the planned opening of MAGS in 1922 was delayed a number of weeks due to a localised typhoid outbreak. There were several other disruptions in the years that followed including in 1947-48 when MAGS was closed for several months due to a significant polio outbreak. And this at a time when our nation was getting back on its feet post-World War II.

William Caradus was the Headmaster at the time. It is no small irony that the new Science Building that was to be opened by our Prime Minister on Tuesday (now deferred) will carry the name of William Caradus – former Head of Science and the second Headmaster of our school!

The message here must be that while we are experiencing unsettling times, generations of MAGS students have weathered not dissimilar storms – and gone on to enjoy immensely successful futures.

We can take great strength from earlier generations of our school as we settle into these temporary disruptions ... and, rest assured, we will get to formally open the William Caradus Block in the future! **Weekly Notices**

Online learning during nationwide lockdown



Mount Albert Grammar School will remain a virtual school, working online until we are advised otherwise.

Term 2 will start Wednesday, April 15, with students working online. This will allow students to continue their studies and stay connected with their classmates via their Google Classrooms, which will be significant and helpful for them.

Contact with Marist students with COVID-19

Yesterday the school was notified that a group of our MAGS students who travel by bus from South Auckland may have been in contact with Marist students who are currently infected with COVID-19.

Please note our MAGS students are considered low risk (casual contacts).

Here is the communication from Auckland Regional Public Health Service:

You will be aware that Marist College has a number of staff and students with COVID-19. A handful of students from Marist, Mount Albert Grammar and Lynfield College have caught school buses with two Marist students while infectious.

Students on some Kiwi Coach buses last week are now considered low risk contacts (called casual contacts):

- The Manurewa bus shared with Mount Albert Grammar in the morning and the afternoon on Wednesday 18 March, Thursday 19 March and Friday 20 March.
- The Mangere Bridge bus with Lynfield College students on Monday 16 March in the afternoon, and Wednesday 11th March, morning and afternoon.

While this will be concerning for you, Auckland Regional Public Health Service considers most of the students on the buses to be at low risk of catching COVID-19. Between four and six students who sat near the infected student on each bus are at slightly higher risk, but it is impossible to identify who these students are.

As part of the Alert Level 4 national shutdown, the students who caught the buses will now be staying at home, away from others. We ask that they take this seriously and remain inside, with no visitors. They should not be socialising with others even at a distance, and they should not go out for essential supplies to the supermarket or pharmacy for 14 days. Here is an <u>information sheet</u> for people considered contacts of someone with COVID. There is a small possibility that your child may develop symptoms of COVID -19, such as a cough, fever and difficulty breathing. In this case, please ring Healthline on 0800 358 5453 and tell them that your child is a contact of a COVID case. They will advise you what to do. Do not take your child to the GP without phoning first. There is information on COVID-19 on the <u>ARPHS website</u>

Please ask students in your home to respect the privacy of the Marist students and not to speculate about or confirm who they are on social media or through text.


