

Year 10 Business students will be holding their ever-popular Market Day next Thursday and Friday.

Students carry out and review a business activity, culminating in stalls selling sweet and savoury treats.

There will be 12 market stalls operating during lunchtime in the Albertian Quad on May 17 & 18. Popular foods include crepes, chop suey, nachos, brownies and sushi.

Groups fund their own start-up costs and share profits among business owners.

Market Day is a taster for business activities to follow in years 11, 12 and 13 when business students build on earlier skills to develop more sophisticated products and services.

Nothing like hands-on experience

Eleven Year 12 Agriculture students visited Taratahl Agricultural Training College in Masterton to gain some real farm experience and to learn about different courses available at Taratahi.

Over four days, they mustered, drafted and weighed both sheep and cattle, and calculated dressing out percentages and income earned. They got a buzz from learning about bees and had an in-depth anatomy lesson while slaughtering a sheep.

Milking 350 cows in a herringbone shed was a much more real experience than with the six cows at our school farm, and the students enacted the birth of a calf in the only classroom lesson.

Zoe Stevens commented, "It was a great trip, we got to do lots of hands-on stuff and learned a lot of new things."

## Greater safety at railway crossings

Auckland Transport and KiwiRail have begun a programme to install automatic safety swing gates to keep pedestrians safe at crossings at railway stations.

As part of the programme, new automatic safety gates are expected to be installed at Asquith Avenue and Rossgrove Terrace crossings (Baldwin Avenue Station), Woodward Road and Lloyd Avenue crossings (Mount Albert Station), and at Fruitvale Road Station. The pedestrian crossing at Metcalf Road in Ranui was the first to get the safety swing gates last year.

These gates are activated by a sensor on the tracks and have a safety zone with an emergency exit gate. These will be clearly signposted. The new gates have been designed to improve the safety of all pedestrians, especially school children who regularly cross the train tracks.

Installation work is starting soon, which means students may need to allow more time in the morning to tag on/off at a different part of the platform.

The annual school Cross Country was held in fine conditions this week with the races on Tuesday and yesterday.

The challenging course around the school and the ASB MAGS Farm was mostly dry but provided some muddy fun across the top of the farm. Seniors can elect to run the Cross Country but the run is compulsory for Year 9 and 10 students. Some staff also took part.
