Celebrating Pink Shirt Day




Our Health Committee members (pictured above with staff) were out this morning on Pink Shirt Day, handing out stickers and pink ribbons, and spreading the word about working




together to stop bullying by celebrating diversity and promoting


Book Drive helps flooded school



Hukarere Girls' College, located in Esk Valley in the Hawkes Bay, was ravaged by floodwaters following Cyclone Gabrielle.

They lost everything. The students and staff had to move to Pukemokimoki Marae in Napier in order to continue their schooling.

Mandy Jarden from Hukarere put a call out on the NZ English Teachers email chain for books and resources to replenish their destroyed stocks. The English teachers of MAGS decided to do a book drive, in an effort to donate books – that may be sitting and gathering dust – to a school in dire need. Spearheaded by English teachers Andrea Reive, Lerena Glucina and Jessica Papesch, and English Club



organised the collection and sorting of what ended up being about 4000 books (with the finally tally still to be determined).

Miss Papesch said, "This was a mammoth effort by students and staff, with junior form classes 09CHP, 09HBN, 10DUN and 10GRS topping their respective year level groups in donations and earning themselves Interform Points. 12FRA/THN took out the prize for most amount of books collected by a senior form class and enjoyed a donut morning tea as their prize.

"Lucia also organised a fundraising donut sale, the profits from which will go towards purchasing stationery supplies for the students of Hukarere Girls' College.

"The books are currently in the process of being sorted and boxed up and will be shipped down to Napier with all shipping kindly organised and costs covered by Adam Lambdin from local freight forwarding company Hemisphere Freight Services Ltd."

Students face ethical dilemmas



Five students took part in the Ethics Olympiad on Wednesday, fielding complex questions as a team via Zoom.

While they didn't place in the top three (the only rankings published), History/Social Studies teacher Mr Halliburton said, "Our plucky part-timers won praise from various judges for their insightful perspectives. Belle Horan (Captain), a three-year veteran of this competition, led the team with aplomb. An enjoyable day all round was summed up by our self-appointed Rookie of The Year: Year 13 Harris Clow, who described the event as, "Engaging [and] stimulating discussions on various ethical case studies."

The other team members were Chloe Targett – Year 13, third and final year as a competitor, Jonathon Yu – Year 12, four-year veteran, and sole survivor of the original MAGS Team Red from 2020, and Ryan Antia – Year 12, second year as a competitor. The eight case studies that the team had practised throughout terms 1 and 2 included topics such as Death Taxes, Anger in Politics, and National Service, amongst other evocative ethical dilemmas.

Mr Halliburton added, "The 2023 edition was the fourth time that Mount Albert Grammar has competed in this national event at the senior level. We intend to march on, through hardship to glory, to compete again in 2024."

Year 11 Exams next week

Year 11 (Level 1) exams begin next week – Monday, 22nd May and run to Friday, 26th May. Students should read the exam timetable and instructions carefully. They can be downloaded here

Students have also received a copy of this timetable via their Google Classrooms and through their Mentors.

These exams are extremely important and may be used as a Derived Grade for a Final Exam if required. The feedback from these exams will also help students to help identify the next steps required to improve these results prior to the final exams.

Students are on exam leave during this time and normal lessons resume on Monday, 29th May. Year 11s must only attend school to sit an examination or, with the permission of a staff member, for tutorial or study purposes. At all other times they must be at home studying.


Students are not permitted to be at St Lukes Mall during the school day or at the mall in school uniform.

All students need to check the timing of their exams carefully as they vary from normal lesson times and there are different exam times for Thursday, 25th May in the morning. It is very important that students arrive at least 20 minutes prior to the start time of the

exam to ensure they are seated and ready to start for the beginning of the exam.

Correct uniform must be worn to exams. Students will not be admitted to an examination in incorrect uniform. Year 11 students taking Level 2 or Level 3 subjects may be able to attend these classes within their study and exam commitments.

However, Level 1 exams take precedence and teachers are aware that they are on official exam leave.

Striding out in Cross Country



On Tuesday, 27 students competed at the North/West Zone Cross Country event at Moire Park in Massey.

After some rain in the days leading up to the event, the sunshine came out in a timely manner. The rain did create a damp course that got muddier with each race.

MAGS students had a strong showing with two students winning their age categories. Nina Chalmers (Year 11) won the Intermediate Girls race in style by 25 seconds with a time of 14:47 on the 4km course.

Theo Bray (Year 11) made it a clean sweep in the Intermediate age category, winning the boys section in a close finish. Theo finished strong in the last 100m to win by two and half seconds over the 5km race.

Other top 10 finishes came from Peggy Taylor – 8th – and Olivia Appleton – 9th – in the Junior Girls category. Eva Yarrow finished 9th in the Intermediate Girls category. MAGS also had success in the cumulative team competitions in the 3- and 6-person categories. They are as follows:
