# Exams and Testing – Just Part of Life!

Our Year 11 students have been sitting subject examinations throughout this week. Formal examinations have been part of a MAGS education for 102 years and will continue to be so well into the future.

As a valid academic measure, the formal exam remains a critical part of measuring achievement. Testing knowledge and skills – at the same time, on the same day – provides valuable data and comparisons for students and teachers as opposed to some of the more 'fluid' assessment approaches.

It is concerning that a number of schools (both primary and secondary) have removed testing of any form from their programmes. In some schools, students can even gain University Entrance without ever having sat an external exam! The value and robustness of an NCEA qualification should not depend on the school you attend!

MAGS' strong support for students entering New Zealand Scholarship is a further endorsement of examinations. Scholarship is the pinnacle of academic achievement in schools and is (unfortunately) now the only true common assessment task that exists in our assessment system.

It is a delight to see our students enjoying such success with this premier award – and we plan to expand our Scholarship programme even further.



# Students getting streetwise




Year 12 Social Science students visited three locations across Tāmaki Makaurau (Lower Queen Street, Ellerslie and Papatoetoe) yesterday with the aim of gathering field data to prove that the shape, size and purpose of these areas are different to one another.

The fieldwork collection involved surveying members of the public, taking photographs, analysing shop types, noting observations and taking pedestrian counts.

This data will now be presented and conclusions made back in class as part of an internal assessment.

Social Studies and Geography Teacher Mr Hobbs said, "The students/ākonga on this trip were a credit to MAGS as they represented the school with pride in these areas and on the train. Examples



of this were when ākonga frequently gave their seats up for elderly or less mobile people entering the trains and the respect shown to members of the public when approached for surveys.




# More bangers for your buck


# AKSS Squash silver medal
