Mr Gibbs honoured for 50 years of service



Our Academic Dean Mr Gibbs was honoured yesterday morning for his 50 years of service to MAGS, with the new staffroom named after him.

Mr Gibbs, who began at MAGS in 1972 as an English and French teacher, has taught for half the history of MAGS, which celebrates its Centenary this year.

Colleagues packed out the staffroom and heard speeches from Headmaster Mr Drumm, long-time colleague Mr Cave (pictured below with Mr Gibbs in earlier years), and former students (now Deputy Principal and English/German teacher respectively) Mr Stradwick

and Mr Ploeg before Mr Gibbs entertained his audience with reminiscences and insights from his 50 years of teaching.



Mr Gibbs has been a driving force in the Languages Department – establishing German for Juniors as well as overseeing the introduction of Te Reo, Chinese and Japanese in his 30 years as HOD Languages. He still teaches German to this day.

In the sporting realm, Mr Gibbs has coached or managed cricket, rugby and golf (as well as chess) over the years. He has been the school pianist ("the piano man", as some students know him) since the 70s, playing at assemblies and supporting musical

productions.

Mr Gibbs was named <u>Albertian of the Year 2021</u> for his service to the school, only the second non-alumnus (after our still-serving Archivist Mr Murphy) to earn that accolade. Mr Gibbs is renowned for going above and beyond the call of duty for his students, whether it be seeking scholarships for them, providing extra tutorials, or always spending intervals and lunchtimes with them.

In his speech, Mr Gibbs said it was the relationships – with students and colleagues – that kept him in teaching for 50 years.

He said: "It is a cliché, but it is true to say that school keeps you young and you have the privilege of seeing the pupils' lives through their own eyes, if you take the trouble to listen and talk to them."

Former Headmaster Maurice Hall, who appointed Mr Gibbs 50 years ago, presented him with the plaque bearing his name that will be placed over the doors to the staffroom, and declared the W.O.H. Gibbs Room officially open.

Mr Drumm explained that the plaque had been crafted by Technology teacher Mr Bailey, using demolition timber from the old Science Block that has been rebuilt to accommodate the new staffroom and Performing Arts spaces.

At MAGS, Jessica was a Visual Art Leader for Ceramics and Painting. She won the People's Choice Award at the MAGS Art Show and the Trophy for Excellence in Painting when she was at MAGS.

Jessica is now studying a conjoint Commerce/Fine Arts degree through the University of Auckland.

Representing NZ in Bio Olympiad

Jacob Miller, of 11GIB, has been picked as one of the four students to represent NZ in the International Bio Olympiad (NZIBO) in Armenia in July.

Last year, Jacob passed the NZIBO Entrance Exam and was awarded a Bronze Certificate.



Early in March this year he was awarded a Silver certificate in the Practical Camp Selection Exam as one of the top 25 students in the country. This entitled him to participate in the Practical Camp in the April holidays where he was one of the top four candidates and was selected to represent New Zealand.

He will be competing against the top four Biology students from more than 75 countries at this prestigious international event. Biology teacher Mrs Nisha said, "In my last 10 years of running this

from MAGS who has been selected to represent NZ. This is huge. We know Jacob will represent New Zealand with pride and we wish him all the best.

"He has put in a tremendous amount of time and effort towards this since August last year and all the credit goes to him."

NZIBO fosters interest, participation, and excellence in biology through participation of secondary school students in the New Zealand Biology Olympiad Programme.

The programme provides University level education in Biology to those students selected to participate in the online tutorial programme.

A great achievement for Year 12 student Leila Belt, who is one of four new members added to ProCare's Youth Advisory Group (YAG).

She will be among 11 young people in the YAG who provide guidance to ProCare, based on

lived experience, to help improve health outcomes for children and young people across Tāmaki Makaurau. The group also helps guide implementation of ProCare's Population Health Strategy.

The ProCare YAG initially started in 2020 as a pilot and has since been implemented permanently.

The group will act as ambassadors for young Aucklanders by meeting regularly to provide insight into how young people think and feel about life in New Zealand, with a particular focus on how they like to interact with primary care and mental health services.

Albertian Artists in the Frame













John Edgar

Stone sculptor John Edgar (1950 - 2021), one of MAGS's most accomplished artistic alumni, came to sculpture via an unconventional route. After attending MAGS in the 1960s, he obtained a BSc in chemistry from the University of New South Wales and worked first as a chemist, then as a prospector before setting up a carving workshop in Auckland in 1978. Largely self-taught, he learnt a lot from the sculpting traditions of the Far East, travelling frequently to source stone and increase his knowledge. John's distinctive banded stones were his signature form: shaped yet unadorned, with lines or crosses in a contrasting material perfectly incorporated into the whole. Stone was sourced from places as varied as Scotland and the Coromandel and he executed every aspect of the work himself, from small pieces to monumental ones. John sought to convey a synthesis of natural opposites in his work: These slices of the land are revelations of how intimately the environment meshes. How seamless are the interrelationships of earth and sky, land and sea, heaven and earth, black and white? The convergence of the two into one?

During his lifetime, John Edgar organised three major touring exhibitions of his work. His sculptures are in private and public collections around the world, such as Te Papa Tongarewa, the National Museum of Australia and the New Zealand section of the Savill Garden in Windsor Great Park, England. His sculptures are also in a number of prominent locations around Auckland such as "Fled Cross", on permanent outdoor display in the Waitäkere City Civic Centre, and the 3.5 metre "Transformer", standing tall on the Auckland Domain sculpture trail.

John Edgar was also a committed environmentalist and supporter of art in his local community, working to establish the Corban Estate Arts Centre and chairing the committee of the Waitakere Ranges Protection Society. He was made an Officer of the New Zealand Order of Merit (ONZM) in 2009 in recognition of his services to art, in particular sculpture.

Revisiting 1981 Springbok Tour



Our former HOD Careers Mr Witten-Hannah returned to MAGS today to give History students a fascinating personal insight into the protests before and during the 1981 Springbok Tour.

Mr Witten-Hannah spoke about his decision to join the anti-apartheid movement protests before the tour in light of the South African regime's brutal oppression of black and coloured people.

When the Springbok rugby tour began, he made the decision to protest at the games, including being part of the group that took to the field at Hamilton and stopped the game. Mr Witten-Hannah said his fears for his safety were outweighed by the hardships of people being oppressed in South Africa.



Twenty three years ago this week



These twin advertisements appeared in *The New Zealand Herald* on 25 May, 1999. Our Archivist Mr Murphy notes, "It preserved the original ideal of two separate schools with one Board.

"The vesting letter from the Minister of Education Nick Smith, 29 July, 1999, noted that: "On 1 January 2000 Mount Albert Grammar School will become a co-educational school and will cease to be a single sex boys' school." [See also Set 35.4].


"That may have been the Minister's view, but we have been true to the original ideal. We are, in a sense, a hybrid. We maintain separate classes for boys and girls at all levels, although in the actual subject classes in the Senior School there are both boys and girls. There is a boy and a girl Head Prefect and boy and girl Duces.

"It may well be that we are the only school with this model. It works; since pupils and parent alike support it."
