## The smell of space

What does space smell like?


Astronauts have consistently reported the same strange odour after lengthy space walks, bringing it back in on their suits, helmets, gloves and tools. It's a bitter, smoky, metallic smell-like seared steak, hot metal and arc welding smoke all rolled into one. Astronauts can't smell it while they're actually bobbing around in it, because the interiors of their space suits just smell plastic-y. But upon stepping back into the space station and removing their helmets, they get a strong, distinctive whiff of the final frontier.



to recreate the space odour on Earth for

astronaut training purposes, said the metallic aspect of the scent may come from highenergy vibrations of ions. But astronauts don't dislike the sharp smell of space, necessarily. NASA astronaut Don Pettit described it this way after a mission back in 2003: "The best description I can come up with is metallic; a rather pleasant sweet metallic sensation. It reminded me of my college summers where I laboured for many hours with an arc welding torch repairing heavy equipment for a small logging outfit. That is the smell of space." This was their first year competing as 'boaties', and they went into nationals as hot favourites as they had won all the competitions they entered throughout the summer except for one, where they got silver. They had often raced up in the U23s at carnivals, as part of their preparation for nationals, and had wins in those events.

They are aiming to be chosen as the NZ boat next season for their age group, and compete in some events in Australia.
