Te Puna o Wairaka Prizegiving Dinner

Te Puna o Wairaka celebrated its Leavers and achievers at a special dinner on Monday night at Te Mahurehure Marae.

There was also a formal hand-over of the kaitātaki wahine (female leader) and kaitātaki tāne (male leader) for the Kapa Haka group in 2020. The sounds of waiata and haka rang out as this year's leaders Assina Te Paa-Kolio and Kisepi Ma'afu Roberts handed over the 'mauri' in the form of a taiaha and patu to the two new leaders: Niua Pomare-Khanna and Charlotte Mann (pictured right).

Headmaster Patrick Drumm was the first speaker on the night – MC'ed by Year 12 students Niua Pomare-Khanna and Tayla Bamber – and he emphasised the importance of Te Puna in keeping te reo alive, empowering Māori students and maintaining diversity at MAGS.

Junior members of Te Puna performed a haka in tribute to the Year 13s, who performed

their own thunderous haka towards the end of proceedings.

When it came to the awards, Abbey-Jean Kaipara won the Top Senior Academic Award and was named All-Round Top Senior Student.

Richard Mann won the "Manu Tute"
Award For Services to Puna and the
wider community, while Assina Te PaaKolio received the "He toka tū"
Award For Contribution to Kapa Haka.
Bree Tipene was All-Round Top Junior
Girl, and the All-Round Top Junior Boy
was Isaiah Nin. The Top Junior
Academic Award went to Nikora Morehu.
The award for Top Senior Māori
Language Orator went to Niua PomareKhanna, and Te Waaka Popata-Henare
was named Top Junior Māori Language
Orator.

When it came to sports achievement, Princess Elliott won the senior award and Stella-Rose Woodman the junior award.

Albertian of the Year: Greg Cave



Associate Academic Dean and HoD Classics Greg Cave is retiring at the end of this year after 46 years of teaching at MAGS but not before being named Albertian of the Year. Mr Cave will be recognised as Albertian of the Year at the annual Albertians Christmas Luncheon to be held at School House at 12pm on Tuesday, November 26.

As a student, Mr Cave spent five years at MAGS before coming back to teach. His father attended MAGS from 1923, and Greg's two sons came to MAGS in the 1980s.

Greg began at MAGS in 1974 as a teacher of Latin. During his time he taught French and Economics, and introduced Japanese as a subject in 1980.

He has been invaluable in his Academic Deaning role, supporting students as they prepare to transition to university and tertiary study.

Tribute to Mr Cave at Assembly



Greg Cave's 46 years of service to MAGS was acknowledged at a Year 13 Assembly by Caitlin Baber (pictured above), who is in Mr Cave's Year 13 Classics class.

Caitlin said, "Mr Cave's expertise is so wide-ranging, coming into class you don't even know what you'll be getting; but one thing's for sure you can expect a crossword about it.

"Mr Cave is notorious for having dry yet timeless dad jokes. His classroom is decorated wall-to-wall not with typical classroom décor, but rather with random memes from Facebook, which he points to when he tries to tell us off. He has sifted through countless university accommodation applications, unbeknownst to you he had a part to play in your plans for next year. He will be slaving away writing up favourable testimonials over the exam period, which is a huge ask for a cohort of over a few hundred people. So when you leave this school and go job-hunting, just remember Mr Cave's effort.

"Mr Cave, I would just like to say thank you for everything you have done, you are a one-of-a-kind teacher. We wish you all the best for your retirement and for the future. Thank you sir."

Measles concerns at exam time

Measles during exams





Measles can stop students sitting exams and taking part in end-of-year activities.

If students get measles they may miss NCEA and other exams.

The Auckland Regional Public Health Service reports that while the number of measles cases is declining, the virus is still circulating in Auckland school communities.

It advises parents to ensure that their children are immunised.

For secondary schools this is a worrying time with external exams underway. Unvaccinated students exposed to measles – or mumps – may need to miss NCEA and other exams. MMR vaccines have been prioritised for anyone under the age of 30 and teachers under the age of 50 years.

Food challenge champions

Four Year 11 students triumphed in the NZIFST CREST Food Innovation Challenge, for which senior secondary school students must develop a consumer food product. David Wu, Max Hertzum, David Li and Liam Middlebrook were mentored by Tip Top and the winning product they created was a protein-enriched milk tea-flavoured ice cream, 'Wheytea'. The production of Wheytea was extensive and difficult as the ice cream had to be made using commercial grade agents such as emulsifiers and stabilisers. Students must follow the principles of food product development as used in the food industry. Two MAGS teams began the challenge in early February this year and worked hard to produce two high-quality products. Each team received sponsorship of \$250 towards the cost.


The other group was mentored by Kerry and produced a high-protein chocolate drink 'Pro-Teen'. Tuck Shop becoming more sustainable

MAGS' Tuckshop is aiming at becoming more sustainable by using biodegradable packaging and cutlery.

Cold meals are served in BioPak packaging, made from sustainably sourced, rapidly renewable materials. The items in the warmers and on the shelves that look like they are wrapped in plastic are actually in Natureflex Cello Bags, which are both biodegradable and compostable.



The Tuckshop, run by Libelle Group, is also in the process of changing all of its cleaning products to biodegradable products.

Parents are encouraged to come along to discuss which device from those recommended will best suit their child's needs.


The school has reviewed which device is best suited for our students' needs and you can visit our BYOD page here for our preferred devices, with relevant specifications and guidance for parents.

We will be hosting a two-part 'formal dress' event for students and parents, commencing


with a formal ceremony held in the F. W. Gamble Hall followed by a 'street food' buffet banquet and celebrations.

Edendale pupils studying stream



Edendale Primary School has been conducting a project at MAGS studying the health of the stream around the school and on the ASB MAGS Farm.

They have been looking at ways to clean up and maintain the health of the waterways.

They also intend to do some planting of natives around MAGS as – being a feeder school – many of the students will end up here.

They have done analysis of the stream, looking at the pH and nitrate levels as well as documenting its ecosystem. The team is led by Amanda Ray, who has children at MAGS. MAGS Science staff and Year 13 Will Newton have also helped out with the project.
