Duke of Ed Bronze Journey




Last weekend saw 18 students go out to the Karangahake Gorge to complete their Bronze journey with Mr Belson and Miss Murray.


Order your 2023 Albertian now


Homestay families required

MAGS is still looking for more wonderful families, as we have a large number of International students starting in 2024. This is a great opportunity to learn about a different culture and build lasting friendships.

Our next student intake will be for Term 1 2024. We will have short- and longterm students, staying for between 10 weeks to a full year. Homestay families are our most popular choice of accommodation as our students benefit from living with an English-speaking family and sharing in the New Zealand family experience.

What are the expectations of a host family?

A host family is expected to provide a clean and comfortable bedroom with a bed, a wardrobe (built-in or freestanding) and drawers, linen and towels, a desk and a lamp and three meals a day.

The application process:

The application process involves police vetting for all family members over 18 years. This is followed by a home visit from the school. This helps us to know a little more about your family's interests and lifestyle and enables us to make a well-informed student match. We pay \$330.00 per week (from 2024) which is paid fortnightly in advance. MAGSROW returns to the water



The Bennett Shield and Eric Verdonk Memorial Regattas held last weekend were the first time our 2023/24 rowing squad got on the water in race conditions.

The regattas provided some amazing racing across all the year groups, who were representing West End Rowing Club in its black and white strip.

Director of Rowing Mr O'Sullivan said, "The new Year 9 rowers had their first race event since beginning the Rowing Academy back in February which was a joy to see. The excitement has been building for weeks and their coaches were delighted that they all had so much fun competing with their friends."

"Overall the team was really happy with the performances displayed by the whole programme over the course of the weekend. There were far too many great results to list but a really exciting situation played out in the final races of Sunday afternoon.



"It is often hard for the rowers to watch racing at regattas due to their commitments around the boatpark alongside preparing for their own races. As we were well prepared with our trailer loading for the return journey, we had the full programme out supporting along the shorefront for the boys and girls U18 8+ races."

Mr O'Sullivan added, "We are delighted to report that MAGS won the Division 1 Eight in both the boys and girls events, alongside the boys Division 2 Eight beating out other Auckland schools like Westlake, Auckland Grammar, St Peter's College and many more.

"We believe that this is the first time any school has done this at the EVMR, which is a pretty amazing achievement for a co-ed programme. The strength and depth of our senior squad is arguably the best we've ever had, coupled alongside our largest Year 9 intake ever.

The opportunity to do something historical this year is immense and really exciting for all involved at MAGSROW."

Junior Girls Tag makes Auckland Champs

The Central/North/West Zone Junior Tag Tournament was held at Moire Park in Massey on Tuesday, with MAGS entering boys and girls teams.

The day consisted of both teams playing six 18-minute games with a small gap between each game. This tested the endurance of all students competing on a warm day.

The boys team started the day in strong fashion, winning 9-0 against Massey High School. Their second game was against a strong Westlake Boys team, with Westlake winning 3-1. To make the top eight quarterfinals, they had to beat Liston College in their last pool game. A dominant performance saw the boys win 8-0.

In the quarterfinal they came up against a strong Rangitoto College team that played with great pace and skill to win. The boys finished the day with a loss to Westlake in the placing semi and then a strong win against Northcote College to finish 7th overall.

The girls had a tight win first-up against Whangaparaoa College 2-1. In their second game, they put on an impressive display against Lynfield College, winning 8-0. This was on the back of playing with some good structure and some brilliant long-range tries.

Their quarterfinal was another close game. The girls held on to beat Westlake Girls Black 3-2. This meant a semi-final against Westlake Girls Red. This was a tight battle with both teams playing high-quality tag. Westlake managed to win 4-2. Their last game of the day was the 3rd/4th playoff against Rangitoto College. This proved to be a close one as well, with the fulltime score being 3-3. Rangitoto were declared the winners as they scored the first try.

With the girls finishing 4th, they qualify for the Auckland Junior Championships to be held in late November.

Assistant Director of Sport Mr Crossan said, "A special thanks goes to Tony Talagi (Boys) and Tutu Tairea (Girls) for their efforts in coaching the teams. Also thanks to Ms Wright, Mr Hipa, Mr Khan and Mr Folomu, who all supported the teams throughout the day."
