David Billing. David was a close friend of her brother, Nicholas Ramsden, who was at MAGS from 1975-78, while Simon Ramsden attended from 1971-74.

Nicholas died in 1978, shortly after leaving MAGS, and his parents, in honour of his memory, presented MAGS with the Nicholas Arthur Ramsden Cup for the Most Improved House Boy, which was awarded annually until it went missing.

Suzy said Simon died seven years ago but when she heard David talking about the Centenary celebrations she decided to attend the dinner "because I wanted to go and remember my brothers and represent them".

"It was great to be there for them – a lot of thought went into the evening and I really enjoyed it."

Original chairs donated to MAGS

In the early years of MAGS there was a row of chairs on stage in the F.W. Gamble Hall. During assembly, staff came in two-by-two and sat in the chairs.

When they were decommissioned in about 1967, they were sold off. Bob Willmott, a master from 1930-69, bought two.

Our Archivist Mr Murphy says of Mr Wilmott, "He was a remarkably gifted man; at home teaching English, History, French and Latin.

"His son, David Willmott, has had the chairs restored by a heritage restorer. They were presented to the School just before the Centennial festivities in late September 2022.

"The image shows David standing behind one of the chairs. It is wonderful to have two pieces of furniture that go back to the earliest years of the Hall."



"The purpose and intentions of the Future Pathways camp, the identification game and the coaches workshop were clear to see with all involved receiving a satisfying and meaningful football experience from the Victory coaching staff."

Both MVFC and MAGS will continue to work closely over coming months as MAGS embeds the MVFC Academy curriculum and philosophy, while aiming to take our Football Academy to play a series of games in Melbourne in the near future.
