In the past couple of weeks, the MAGS community has lost two great Albertians in the form of entertainer and broadcaster Max Cryer, MBE, and conceptual artist Billy Apple, ONZM.

Max (pictured right), who died at age 86, attended MAGS from 1950-52 before embarking on an illustrious career on radio, stage and screen as a singer, entertainer, broadcaster, producer and presenter.

The height of his career was through the 60s and 70s when he recorded albums, performed in cabaret and musicals, and appeared as a performer and presenter on many TV shows.

In later life, he indulged his love for language and published books on etymology and had a long-running radio show focused on the quirks of language.

Billy Apple, who died aged 86, attended MAGS from 1949-51 as Barrie Bates but changed his name to Billy Apple in 1962 and became a living brand.

His work is associated with the New York and British schools of pop art in the 1960s (when he collaborated with the likes of Andy Warhol), and with the Conceptual Art movement in the 1970s. From there, his work focused on the

economics of art in the 1980s when he produced his famous solid gold apple.
In 1990 he returned to NZ and kept working and exhibiting – one of his more recent projects was having



his genome sequenced and digitised so 'the artist would live forever'. Billy was invited back to MAGS by our

Board of Trustees Chair Greg Moyle in 2019 (as pictured) and was taken on a tour of Mr

Moyle's art collection displayed around the school.

Mr Moyle said, "Afterwards I asked him if he was prepared to provide an artwork for the School Collection.

"The work he provided (pictured above right, and on display in the main building) was his idea and concept, using the school colours of his day. Billy was a 'perfectionist' in respect of ensuring that the design, workmanship, colours etc. were as per his brief.

"His passing, along with other Albertian art luminaries John Edgar and Max Cryer is a great loss to our MAGS community in this our Centennial Year."
