As part of Te Wiki o te Reo Māori (Māori Language Week), MAGS' Komiti Māori has been doing a great job posting videos on its <u>Instagram page</u> using Māori phrases and kupu (words).

This year marks the 50th anniversary of the Māori Language Petition, which asked for active recognition of te reo Māori in Aotearoa, and for the language to be taught in schools. This event led to many of the kaupapa we have today, including Te Wiki o te Reo Māori.



Te reo Māori has been an official language of New Zealand since 1987, and Te Wiki o te Reo Māori has been celebrated in New Zealand since 1975, in an effort to raise awareness of the language, and get New Zealanders to embrace te reo Māori and use it more.

Health Expo promotes wellbeing





Secondary teacher training 2023

Mount Albert Grammar School is one of 22 Auckland schools involved in the Auckland Secondary School Teaching Training Programme that is run in conjunction with University of Waikato.

This programme offers the opportunity to train as a secondary school teacher within a secondary school environment, while completing the Post Graduate Diploma in Teaching online. 2023 sees this programme in its third year of operation.

Trainees accepted into this programme spend a full year working on site at MAGS, completing their Post Graduate Diploma in Teaching online with the University of Waikato. The programme provides the opportunity for trainees to be paired with a subject specific mentor and work alongside them in a both a senior and junior class. There is an expectation that trainees will also choose to be involved in the co-

curricular programmes within the school: for example, those in the arts, sports or service pillars.

During the year, trainees will also have the opportunity to participate in a three-week professional experience (practicum equivalent) at one of the other Auckland schools in the programme. Plus, there are also 12 professional development days hosted across the other Auckland schools involved.

MAGS will meet the costs associated with the Post Graduate Diploma in Teaching and pay a stipend, currently \$10,000, for the year.

We are specifically interested in those who wish to train as Mathematics, Physics, Technology and Te Reo Māori teachers. However, applications from other subject areas are also welcome.

In Memoriam: Sir Graeme Davies

Distinguished academic and Albertian Sir Graeme Davies (1950-54) has died at home on August 30 after a brief illness at the age of 85.

At MAGS, Sir Graeme was Dux in 1954 and focused his studies on Mathematics and Science. He is pictured right taken from an article in The Albertian 1955 in recognition of his 10th place in the University Junior Scholarship Exam

Headmaster at the time Murray Nairn noted in his testimonial: "He has also taken a full part in outside activities. He has played Soccer for school teams each year and in his last two years has



been in the 1st Association XI. After playing Cricket for two years he changed to Softball and has been in the 1st IX the last two years. Other activities include successes in Swimming events and Life Saving, Choir work, and progress in the Cadet Battalion to the position of Regimental Quarter Master Serjeant."

Sir Graeme graduated from the University of Auckland with a BE in Aeronautical Engineering and a PhD in Materials Science.



He then arrived as Fellow to St Catharine's College, Cambridge in 1962, subsequently becoming an internationally distinguished academic metallurgist. During the following 30 years he led and transformed a series of institutions of higher education.

He was Professor of Metallurgy and Pro Vice-Chancellor at the University of Sheffield 1977-1986; Vice-Chancellor of the University of Liverpool 1986-91; Chief Executive of the Higher Education Funding Council 1991-95; Principal of the University of Glasgow 1995-2003; Vice-Chancellor of the University of London 2003-11, and the only Emeritus VC the University has appointed.

He served many more public institutions and charities in the UK and overseas and received extensive honours for his contributions. Sir Graeme was knighted in 1996 for his services to higher education.

Sir Graeme was awarded 13 honorary degrees during his lifetime and published many books, mainly on metallurgy.

He is survived by his wife Svava, his son Michael, his daughter Helena and five grandchildren.
