One hundred years on...



C.C. Lamb was our first Head Prefect and Captain of the Rugby 1st XV in 1922 – and he has two relations currently attending MAGS: great-great-nieces Sophie Lamb (9PEA) and Jessica Lamb (12LND). The father of Sophie and Jessica, Geoff Lamb, says his uncle, Ross Lamb, has compiled the following notes on C.C. Lamb:



Cecil Cunningham Lamb (known as Bris) was born in Maungakaramea, Northland, on February 24, 1905, the son of the local schoolmaster.

Bris was the only one of five siblings not to go to Whangarei High School. He was probably home-schooled under the watchful eye of his father at Maungakaramea until the latter moved to Auckland to be inaugural headmaster at Avondale South School (later renamed Blockhouse Bay School) in 1920.

At MAGS, Bris was also Company Sgt Maj in the school's Cadet Corps in 1922. He married Ruby Doris Savage in 1937 and, in 1938, their only child, Brian Gerald, was born. The 1941 electoral roll has the family living at 20 Onslow Rd, near Eden Park, and after World War II they lived at Maroa Rd, Penrose.

Bris's wife Doris, passed away in 1959 aged 64. Bris suffered a long illness before finally succumbing on February 15, 1967, aged only 61 and is interred at Waikaraka Cemetery.




Waka Ama medal haul at World Champs

Marlin and Marnie Toloa have each returned with a haul of medals from the Waka Ama World Championships held in London last month.

The pair represented New Zealand as well as competing for their clubs at the World Champs.

Marnie, as a NZ representative, was a finalist in the U16 Women's V1 (Individual) 500m (3rd in heat, 6th in final). In the World Club Champs, she won Gold in the U16 Women's V6 (six paddlers) 500m final, Silver in the U16 Women's V6 1000m final, and Bronze in the U19 Women's V6 500m final. Marlin, as a NZ representative, was a finalist in the U16 Men's V1 500m (3rd in heat, 6th in final), and won Gold in the U19 Men's V6 500m final and U19 Men's V6 1000m final. In the World Club Champs, he won Gold in



the U16 Men's V6 500m final, the U16 Men's V6 1000m final, the U16 Men's 500m V12 final, and the U19 Men's V12 500m final.

Vex Robotics at MAGS



Last Saturday, MAGS held its first VEX Robotics scrimmage in 10 years.

Twenty teams and more than 100 students from schools across Auckland competed from excellent robotic schools such as Glenfield, Avondale and Lynfield.

The feature of this competition was the game Spin Up where students design, build and code a robot. The robot was required to shoot discs into goals, be able to horizontally expand in area and spin cylindrical goals for your team. MAGS entered three teams and two advanced to the playoff rounds.

One, led by Anatol Coen and Nick Lees, won a series of hard-fought games and made it to the final where they were narrowly defeated.

Max Davison, Robotics Captain, said, "The day was a massive success with students showcasing their hard work and skills in the lead-up to the national competition.

"The MAGS robotics team showed great enterprise by running a fundraiser selling pizzas, doughnuts and baking which will go towards new robot parts and developing the next generation of robotics students. Thank you to the Maths Department for letting us use the MH Block."

Mathematicians run the numbers

Last week, MAGS had four junior teams out at Barfoot and Thompson Stadium competing in the annual Auckland Mathex Competition.

The two Year 9 teams performed admirably, scoring 95 and 75 points out of a total of 100.

Our Year 10A team, consisting of Ava Poynter, Harrison Fu, Macy Li and Ben Wright, placed 8th-equal, with 95 points. The Year 10B team, made up of Victor Coen, Ansel Weatherall, Fearghal Reid and Victor Kyawzaw, came awfully close to a podium finish, cracking 100 with six minutes to spare which saw them



placing 5th. This was particularly impressive given that only seven teams out of 104 reached the maximum score.

Mathematics teacher Mr Walden adds, "Victor Coen and Ava Poynter should be further congratulated for placing in the top 30 nationally (out of 4500 students!) in the 2022 Otago Junior Maths Competition.

"The competition was held over two rounds, with the final problems being a good challenge for all who competed. Students are encouraged to get involved in future problem-solving opportunities."

Albertian wins film awards

Congratulations to Albertian Bala Murali Shingade, whose short film *Perianayak*i won the New Zealand's Best 2022 Audience Award at Whānau Mārama New Zealand International Film Festival.

Bala also won two of the three Jury Prizes – the Auckland Live Spirit of The Civic Award and the Flicks Award for Best Film. As winner of the Audience Award, Bala receives 25 per cent of the box office from New Zealand's Best 2022 screenings in the four main centres. Bala, who attended MAGS from 2009-2013, was a Prefect in his final year.

He went on to complete a BA (hons) and MA from the University of Auckland, majoring in Screen Production. Since finishing his MA in 2018, Bala Murali has been working in film and theatre as a writer, director, producer and actor.



In 2019, Bala Murali received the Geoff Evans Prize for Excellence in Screen Production for his MA thesis film, *Brown Boy Lies*, a coming-of-age short film featuring a young Indian New Zealander as the lead character.

A host is expected to provide a clean and comfortable bedroom with bed, wardrobe (built-in or free-standing) and drawers, linen and towels, desk and lamp, heating in room, three meals a day



plus snacks and laundry. We prefer our students to be placed within a 20-minute commute of school

What is the benefit of hosting?

- An opportunity for your children to learn a different language and build an international friend network. We have many families who have visited or sent their children to stay with their past homestay students overseas.
- Prompt fortnightly payment of \$640 (\$320 per week).

In Memoriam: Max Weston



Albertian Max Weston (1947-51) passed away on August 6, aged 88 years.

He was a member of the Senior 8 in 1950 and 1951 (as pictured above, fourth from left in the back row) and a Prefect in 1951.

Max was also a member and stalwart of the West End Rowing Club since 1950, when he started rowing for MAGS.

During his rowing career Max won four NZ
Championship Eight Titles (Redcoats) for West End.
During his membership Max held nearly every position at the club: Committee member, Club Secretary, Club
Captain, President and Patron. In 1980 he was honoured with being made a Life Member.



Max was heavily involved in MAGS rowing via this connection with West End during the 70s and 80s.

He also made other major contributions to the sport of rowing, holding many positions with the Auckland Rowing Association and as part of the team that organised the 1978 World Rowing Championship regatta at Lake Karapiro.

Sports Update

Curling Seniors NISS Champions



In Winter Tournament Week, we had two teams competing in the North Island Secondary Schools Curling Championship held at Paradice Ice Rink in Avondale, with the Senior team named champions and the Juniors finishing runners-up.

Our Senior team of Jack Millar (13HMR), Liam Baber (13JTN), Tahlia Petersen (13ANH), Jude Sheehan (13CNL) and Sofia Skinner (13AHN) were in the Mixed grade, played as a round-robin tournament.

Game One saw MAGS edge
Long Bay 5-3 and a 7-2 victory
over Massey in Game Two left
MAGS in a good position at the
end of day one. Game three was
against Mount Roskill, favourites
for the title. A fantastic fourstone score from MAGS in the
first end had Mount Roskill
playing catch-up and while they
mounted a spirited fight back,
MAGS held them off to win 7-5.



Game four was another close 5-3 win against Long Bay while game five was an emphatic 17-2 demolition of Massey. This left MAGS unbeaten and thinking it would be a showdown with Mount Roskill in the final game. Then news came in from the other sheet – Long Bay

had beaten Mount Roskill 5-4 in the very last end of their game. MAGS' position at the top of the table was now unassailable and with one round still to go MAGS were Mixed grade North Island Champions for 2022.

Our Junior team consisting of Koru McDonald (11BRN), Felix McElwee (11GIB), Samuel Reeves (11GIB), Max Shallard (11PNE) and Riley Hobbs (09CLN) were in the final against Lynfield College in the Boys Division in a best-of-five format.

TIC Ms Hobbs reports, "Our novice team knew it would be a tough challenge against the more experienced side, but when a tight first game finished only 4-1 to Lynfield they saw they had a chance. In the second game MAGS took a lead from the first end and won the game 6-2.

"On Day Two, Game Three saw Lynfield three stones up with just one end to play. However, MAGS threw their best end of the competition getting the three they needed for a 5-5 draw. Game Four, however, went to Lynfield 7-3, leaving a mountain to climb in the final game. With two of our stones in the house there was the possibility that it could happen, but alas with one expert shot knocking out our score, the game, and the title were Lynfield's."

Wrestlers come out on top

Four students from MAGS competed at the New Zealand Secondary School Wrestling Nationals last Sunday at Rutherford College.

The day proved to be a successful one for our wrestlers, gaining three 1st places and a 3rd place.

Sadi Ansari (Year 11) made a good showing, finishing third in his category. Max Shallard (Year 11) won all of his three fights in



the Senior Male Under 55kg category to win the division. Sean Harding (Year 11) continues to show his promise in the sport, winning the Senior Male Under 65kg section.

Tiger-Lily Cocker-Lemalie (Year 13) – fresh off her great effort representing Tonga at the Commonwealth Games, where she narrowly missed out on a medal – finished first in her division. This is the second year in a row that Tiger-Lily has won a New Zealand Secondary School title.
