Football 1st XI National Runners-up



Well done to the Football Boys 1st XI, who finished second in New Zealand after their Winter Tournament Week Competition in Christchurch.

They made today's final after beating St Kentigern College 2-1 yesterday but Sacred Heart College came away with the win 3-0 this afternoon.

Also runners-up were the Netball Premiers, who lost 31-22 this afternoon to Epsom Girls Grammar in their UNISS Final at Mt Maunganui. Earlier in the day, they had beaten Howick College 31-29 to make the final.

Today, the Rugby League 1st XIII finished third in the country after beating Rotorua Boys High in their 3rd/4th playoff at Pulman Park, Takanini.

In their Co-ed Nationals Semifinal today, the Rugby First XV lost 55-18 to St Peter's Cambridge in Palmerston North. On Sunday they will play off for 3rd/4th against either Fielding or Rangiora High Schools.

A win today on the Sir BG Williams Field against St Patricks College Town meant the Rugby U15 Colts finished in seventh. They started strongly with three wins in the competition but two close losses derailed their campaign.

On Tuesday, the Basketball Junior Premier Boys claimed fourth spot after losing to Westlake Boys High in their final game.

More than 1000 people turned out to see the school production *The Green Room*, with almost all of the four performances at Centennial Theatre selling out.

The production, which was largely conceived by two of the leads – Ella Brislen and Seamus Stalker – was centred around a director (Seamus) who laments that he did not get the accolades he was hoping for in his final Broadway show.

In an attempt to cheer him up his PA (Ella) and production manager (Billy McColl) start to reminisce about the past, and, in a magical turn of events, all three are whisked into a parallel world of musical theatre.

Director Arts Co curricular Jacqui Cesan said, "The lead actors were all outstanding in their roles. The student choreographers did an amazing job of choreographing for the dancers overseen by Miss French, and the chorus under Mr Jaffrey took on the challenge of learning movement as well as singing with gusto. Mr Sinclair worked with the band and prepared the arrangement of the musical items. All this coupled with Miss Hughes' inspired script and direction, all came together to present a show that was magical, and all performers – supported by a student production team lead by Aislin Reid – performed with fantastic energy and 100 per cent commitment.

#### Firefighters inspire students



The school had two special guests today from the New York Fire Department who spoke about leadership and their experiences during the 9/11 terror attacks.

Retired Chief Peter Hayden and Deputy Chief Jay Jonas (pictured right) were accompanied by Auckland Airport fire crew chief Tony Scott, a driving force behind the Memorial Firefighter Stair Climb of the Sky Tower, which takes place on September 11 and honours all of the 343 NYFD firefighters who died in the 2001 attack on the Twin Towers, as well as the 59 NZ firefighters who have lost their lives in the line of duty. A selection of students – Prefects, Air Cadets and History students – listened

as Mr Jonas and Mr Hayden recounted

being on the scene of the tragedy and the sort of decision-making and leadership that was involved in saving the lives of civilians and colleagues in a dangerously unpredictable situation.

Mr Jonas was caught in the North Tower with his crew when it collapsed but survived by staying calm and using his training and experience.

Mr Hayden and Mr Scott shared insights on what it takes to be a good leader: training, building trust, personal growth and courage.

#### Success at Eureka! Awards


Shalin Shah (pictured) placed in the top four at the National Finals of the Sir Paul Callaghan Eureka! Awards in Wellington yesterday and picked up \$5000 for his efforts. The Sir Paul Callaghan Eureka! Awards competition challenges secondary school and tertiary undergrads to deliver a 12-minute presentation about how an application of science or technology will benefit New Zealand's economic, environmental and social wealth and well-being.

Shalin's presentation 'Clean Meat: The Answer to Dirty Farming' impressed the judges, and

the two other MAGS representatives at the Finals also spoke well.

Germain Hellriegel-White delivered his presentation 'The War on Superbugs and our Secret Weapon, with gusto, as did Ellen Zhang ('The Answer is Smaller Than You Think: Nanotechnology').

Ellen had already picked up a \$5000 scholarship from Federated Farmers for her presentation in an earlier round of the Sir Paul Callaghan Eureka! Awards.


#### Senior Exams next week

Senior exams begin next Wednesday, 12 September and run to Friday, 21 September

21 September.

Students have been given a copy of their timetable, and arrangements should have been made for students who have exam clashes. You can download a copy of the exam timetable by clicking <u>here</u> Students are on exam leave during this time and normal lessons resume on Monday, 24 September.

Year 11, Year 12 and Year 13 students must only attend school to sit an examination or, with the written permission of a staff member, for tutorial or study purposes. At all other times they must be at home studying.



Students are not permitted to be at St Lukes mall during the school day or at the mall in school uniform.

All students need to check the timing of their exams carefully as they vary from normal lesson times – in particular on Thursday, 13 September and Thursday, 20 September. Correct uniform must be worn to exams. Students will not be admitted to an examination in incorrect uniform.

The purpose of these exams is to provide evidence of the prerequisites required for entry into courses for 2019 and as such they should be treated with the same importance as the external examinations at the end of the year.

In addition, they give an indication of progress to date and clear strategies for improvement before the final exams in November.

Some students sitting Scholarship examinations may have their exam on Monday, 24 September or Tuesday, 25 September if necessary.

#### Changes to school bell times

To accommodate Senior Exams, bell times will be adjusted across the school day, from next Monday, 10 September to Friday, 21 September.

Lunchtime will occur at 12.30pm and the start of afternoon lessons will coincide with the start of the afternoon exams at 1.10pm during Weeks 8 & 9.

Please also note that three-hour afternoon exams do not finish until after 4.10pm and this may be outside normal transport arrangements.



#### Two recent books by Albertian historians

Two Albertian authors have each produced recent works that have come to the attention of our archivist, Brian Murphy.


The first is a memoir by Russell Stone – *As it Was: Growing Up in Grey Lynn and Ponsonby Between the Wars* (David Ling Publishing, 2017, 240pp).

Professor Stone ONZM, PhD (1936-1940) has written nine books on early Auckland. He is



the leading authority in that field. He is also the author of *Tradition and Change: Mount Albert Grammar School: The First Seventy-five Years* (Mount Albert Grammar School, 1997, 405pp). The second is a political history by Michael Bassett – New Zealand Prime Ministers: From Dick Seddon to John Key (David Ling Publishing, 2017, 594pp).

The Hon Dr Michael Bassett CNZM,



QSO HhD (1953-1955) has written a number of books including biographies of four New Zealand Prime Ministers.

He was an MP from 1972-1990, including various cabinet portfolios. After politics he was Professor of History at the University of Western Ontario.

#### Reminder about absence and leave

#### Student absence

Parents must notify the school on the morning of the absence. They may do so in the following ways:

- · By note to the Student Centre
- $\cdot$  If a student's absence was not notified on the day they were away, they should bring a note explaining the reason for their absence on the day they return to school.
- The absence note must be delivered to the Student Centre.

#### Late to School

If a student is going to be late to School, the School should be notified in any of the ways listed above. The student must visit the Student Centre on arrival at School to receive a Late Pass.

#### Exeats for appointments

Where possible the student should bring a note to School to show their teacher at the time of leaving, enabling the teacher to release them from class.

A confirmation email or phone message to the Attendance Officer or Student Centre at the contacts above is also required prior to the time the student must leave School.

The student must visit the Student Centre to sign out before leaving the School grounds.
