

It is a delight to bring you the mid-year edition of The Lion as we celebrate another semester of outstanding achievement by our MAGS young people.

The MAGS of 2024 is an incredible place. Opportunities abound for our students across the artistic, sporting and academic landscapes. Yet a service ethos ensures we keep our feet on the ground, with students encouraged to lift up those around them as we seek collective success.

Creating such a community is not a chance event. While our students have an eye on future pathways, they also possess an intrinsic understanding of the importance of the past – and those who have shaped our school over the last 103 years.

Two giants in the story of MAGS have been recently honoured by our school. Former Headmasters Murray Nairn (1956 – 1969) and Maurice Hall (1970-1988) have been both celebrated and commemorated for their tenure at MAGS – a period where they led the school consecutively for 33 years.

The opening and dedication of the new Murray Nairn Building at the end of last term was momentous for the school. This magnificent

22-classroom facility has a library space on the ground floor. The upper levels house classes for the teaching of Social Sciences, a senior student study area along with office and administrative spaces. Murray Nairn's legacy with MAGS stretches back to his original appointment as a Mathematics Teacher in 1934. He enjoyed a period in charge of the MAGS boarding facility at School House before, like so many of his generation, being called to serve during World War II where he received his MBE (Military) for services to the RNZAF.

To have Murray's immediate family present at the opening celebration was wonderful. Further to allowing the school to name the new building after their father and grandfather, the generosity of Murray's family has extended to loaning his MBE to the school for display in our main building.

Adjoining the front of the Murray Nairn Building is our new whare wānanga – 'Te Puna Wānanga', which will accommodate the learning of Te Reo Māori as well as housing Te Puna O Wairaka – our Māori whanau group. Te Puna Wānanga is destined to become the heart of tikanga at MAGS.

The symbolism of the building is not lost on the school community. The Nairn Building is a nod to the past, recognising a leader who served generations of post-war MAGS students and engendered great respect from those who knew him. And our whare, while part of the same structure, reaches out from the front of the building recognising a school prepared to evolve alongside its changing community.





Local MP Melissa Lee officially opened the Murray Nairn Building and was joined by members of Murray's family, grandson David Hillier, daughter Wendy Innes and her husband John.



In 2016, Hon Nikki Kaye and Maurice Hall opened the building named after him. Maurice had been Head of Mathematics and taught in what was D Block. A new parallel building was joined to the refurbished original 1970 building by an atrium and is now the HQ of the Mathematics Faculty.

These two spaces sit together comfortably in partnership. They stand as icons to the values of tradition and change – themes that have carried great weight throughout the journey of MAGS.

The Murray Nairn Building has been brought to life by the hundreds (thousands) of students who enjoy this space each day. I think Murray Nairn would have loved seeing the young people of MAGS learning and connecting in this building which carries his name.

Shortly after the blessing of the Murray Nairn Building in April, we received the sad news of the passing of Maurice Hall, the 4th

Headmaster of MAGS.

Maurice Hall was appointed to MAGS in 1962 as Head of Mathematics and quickly gained a reputation as an expert subject teacher and leader. In 1970 he succeeded Murray Nairn as Headmaster and led the school for 19 years through what was, at times, tumultuous social change in New Zealand and in schools.

One of Maurice's tasks early in his tenure was to oversee the MAGS Golden Jubilee celebrations in 1972. So it was special then in 2022 – our centennial year as a school – to have Maurice back on stage at MAGS, addressing our senior students at our Centennial Assembly – just like he had done on the same stage 50 years before! At 93 years of age, he was so comfortable at the podium and spoke brilliantly to our students. Everyone in the F.W. Gamble Hall that morning knew we were witnessing an event, and a person unique in our school story. The respect was palpable.

Maurice Hall never lost his love of supporting MAGS sporting teams. Up until last year, he would regularly attend the 1st XV home Rugby fixtures, turning up impeccably dressed in jacket and tie, and always offering a succinct appraisal of our MAGS 1st XV's performance on the day!

Maurice's presence has been a constant at MAGS for over 60 years. And his name lives on daily in the school with our students and staff enjoying the use of the Maurice Hall Building.

Schools, like societies and nations rely on leaders who can share a vision, engender hope and create confidence for the future. It requires laying foundations upon which future generations can build their own goals and aspirations.

It has been wonderful to look back, acknowledge and thank two special people in the story of MAGS who have done just that!


Murray Nairn, who had been a mathematics teacher and Senior Housemaster, took over as the School's third Headmaster in 1960. and retired in 1969.

He came with impressive academic and educational achievements. He was a Junior and Senior National Scholar at Auckland Grammar School and a Senior Scholar of the University of New Zealand, graduating with First Class Honours in Mathematics.

His first appointment after Training College was to MAGS in 1934 where he also served as assistant Housemaster at School House and then Senior Housemaster in 1936 and 1937 until he left to get married.

He then moved to Avondale College, first as Careers Advisor and then as Joint Head of Mathematics until becoming an Inspector of Post Primary Schools and Associate Principal of Auckland Training College. He returned to MAGS as Headmaster in 1956.

During WWII, he was an Education Officer in the R.N.Z.A.F. and became Chief Ground Instructor for the Initial Training Wing for Aircrew, and the Officer commanding the unit, for which he was awarded an M.B.E. (Military Division). He also served as Graduate's representative on the Council of Auckland University from 1951 to 1967, able therefore to keep in touch with MAGS boys attending university.



When he returned to MAGS, he was a regular figure every Saturday morning and afternoon watching sports games and was much admired for that. He was responsible for moving School House from 807 New North Rd where it stood in six acres of land, to a playing field next to the school. Also during his tenure, a new classroom block replaced dilapidated prefabs.

In their 1997 'Tradition and Change', Albertians Professor Russell Stone and Neville McMillan describe how Murray

achieved a "spectacular" transformation of the grounds and buildings, starting with the first ever coat of paint for the main building (34 years after it was built), and six new tennis courts, prompted by the Duke of Edinburgh's visit in 1956, and, by the end of his tenure, boasting the complete absence of pre-fabricated classrooms despite an increased roll

He also navigated widespread staff shortages in the 1960s in which "his personal charisma, and the good name he jealously guarded for the school, served to persuade existing staff to remain and strengthened the school's appeal to potential recruits", all no doubt assisting in achieving the School's excellent academic ranking, measured in a 1967 Otago study by the number of University Scholarships as second only to Auckland Grammar in the whole of New 7ealand.


Murray believed in the concept of the 'all-rounder', able to excel both academically and in sport and recreation and put "an extremely high estimate on the value of team games". The school also enjoyed outstanding sporting success during his tenure. His was the era of Sir Peter Snell and Sir Bryan 'BG' Williams.

In the 1960s, the Rugby First XV won the Auckland championship four times, was runner up twice and came third twice.

He was a traditionalist in an era of youthful radicalism who was prepared to adapt, "striking the right balance between conserving what was good from the past while innovating (cautiously) for the future". He "always tried to encourage support rather than enforce his point of view" and "was an inspiring leader, with the capacity to arouse great respect and affection among staff and boys alike", an "exceptional and well-loved Head" who "always thought himself as part of a team"

J.G. 'Butch' Brown's Golden Jubilee History of 1972 also records Murray Nairn's own reflections: "I have striven to treat every boy of the School with natural respect. One must be let down on occasion, but I have had the very considerable joy of receiving respect from most of the thousands of boys who have been at the School. This has been and shall always remain, my most abiding joy".





Maurice Hall came to MAGS in 1962 from Avondale College as Head of the Mathematics Department.

He had won a University Scholarship and studied at University of Auckland where he graduated MA with honours in Mathematics.

In 1969 he took up a Senior Lectureship at Massey University before becoming our fourth Headmaster in 1970.

Maurice was regarded as an outstanding Mathematics teacher and regularly lectured and advised on new developments in the teaching of Mathematics and co-authored Mathematics text books. He had also studied languages at high school and university, which gave him a sympathy for the wider

field of liberal arts. Reflecting on his time as Headmaster, he said, "I wanted exam success in the school to reflect understanding and not be the distortion of exam success through drilling with little understanding. "I believed that many would be better

studying the humanities, which, in my opinion, develop a greater understanding of human attitudes and responses and require pupils to commit themselves to personal opinions rather than work through the objective logic of maths and science." Students remember Maurice as a caring, friendly teacher. When he returned as Headmaster, the school, and New Zealand as a whole, was just entering a period of dramatic social change and it was Maurice's task to steer the school through this while at the same time maintaining the core values of the school. For the first time the school had to devise programs for students with little or no English. The school slowly developed into a multicultural school and was one of the first participants in the Secondary Schools' Polynesian Festival (now known as Polyfest). Maurice fostered the Arts and the school opened its first Music suite in 1983. In addition to annual drama productions, the school produced a series of musicals starting in 1981 that fostered closer relations with Marist Sisters' College and Auckland Girls'

Sport continued to be important in the school, with many successes across most codes but the highlight was probably the school's victory in the inaugural secondary schools' rugby competition in 1982.

In 1976, the new Library Block was opened by Sir Robert Muldoon, the Prime Minister and an old boy of the school.

Two years later the squash courts were opened, and in 1984 Sir Robert Muldoon returned to open the "new gymnasium", a full-sized facility that replaced the old wooden structure which now houses the Learning Centre. Maurice had steered the school through a number of fundraising ventures, which allowed the school to build a modern gymnasium that suited the needs of the school.

In 1972 Maurice appointed the first woman to teach on the staff since the end of World War II. From then on women were appointed in greater numbers, some attaining positions of responsibility, and all of them contributing positively to the life of the school. Maurice instituted the Parents' Association to allow parents to have a greater voice in the education of their sons.

In 1986, the Auckland Grammar Schools' Board, which had been responsible for the school since 1922, was dissolved, meaning the school had its own Board of Governors allowing even greater input from parents. Maurice was instrumental in setting up a very successful Board, which was soon to be known as the Board of Trustees.

Maurice's education philosophy can be summed up in the introduction to the 1981 Albertian: "The school strives to meet the needs of those it serves. Above all it strives to respect the individuality of all its members."

When it was time for teachers to write reports, he always reminded them that they were writing about the children whose parents loved them and so teachers should always find something positive to write.

Maurice was dedicated to the school. The 1988 Albertian contains a long valedictory. One sentence sums up his dedication. "Except for his wife and family, who gave him constant support, nobody will really know how much time Mr Hall devoted to the school."

This devotion continued and he regularly attended sports and cultural fixtures.

ANZAC SERVICE ASSEMBLY

Pūkāea and bagpipes heralded the entry into the F.W. Gamble Hall on April 11 of MAGS staff, students, guests and cadets at the start of a service to remember our 202 fallen Albertians.

As Dekon Tetini played the pūkāea (a long, wooden wind instrument), piper Andrew Wilkie escorted guests for this special Year 9 assembly, also attended by Albertians and service people.

Kingston Ballantyne performed the mihi and Chase Hartley the karakia at this year's Anzac Assembly, which also saw a performance from our Gloriana choir, singing Hope Lingers On.

Year 13 History students Jamie Wheeler and Tyler Brown spoke

about our fallen Albertians, and in particular Albertians John Clarke and Geoffrey Coldham. John Clarke's poem Sigh Not is read at the service, and Geoffrey Coldham is memorialised at MAGS with academic awards in his name still presented to this day. Both students spoke about how Anzac values of loyalty, sacrifice, integrity and resilience remained admirable and aspirational.

As at every ANZAC Service, the names of fallen Albertians were read aloud, the Ode of Remembrance was read, and a laying of wreaths was performed at our cenotaph during the Last Post and Reveille, played by student Kiri Lovatt, as the school flag was lowered and raised both inside the hall and at the cenotaph, where the names of the fallen Albertians are inscribed in stone.

The assembly was followed by a morning tea for invited guests in the W.O.H. Gibbs Room.







MT ALBERT ANZAC SERVICE

A delegation of Mount Albert Grammar School prefects attended the ANZAC service held by the Albert-Eden Local Board on Thursday, 25 April, marking 109 years since the Gallipoli landings.

Head Prefect Toby Forster, who spoke at the service, said, "ANZAC day is an important opportunity for us to commemorate fallen soldiers, as well as thank current and former servicemen and women. Past conflicts – from Gallipoli to Afghanistan – have left a significant legacy at our school, with over 200 Albertians having served and lost their lives overseas.

On behalf of our Prefect Team, I would like to thank the organisers of the event and community members for allowing us to participate in such a meaningful gathering. 
MODEL UNITED NATION

blood will go on to help improve 264 fellow Kiwis' lives around the country. From one blood donation (470ml) this will be split into red cells, platelets, and plasma; these are the three lives you are saving with each donation."

The NZ Blood service have again commended our students and staff on their generosity in donating, and the impeccable behaviour observed on the day. They passed on that our students are always a pleasure to work with.

Mrs Brown said, "The tireless work of members from the Health Committee, some of whom are pictured left, with spreading the word, recruitment of donors leading up to the day as well as their help on the day itself contributed immensely to the drive's success - thank you for all your continued hard work.

"To everyone that was able to donate, thank you. You have made a lifesaving contribution."

Commerce

Three MAGS students – Noah Curtis, Rimu Frandi and Keon Leota – were among 45 rangatahi chosen from schools all over NZ to participate in the Young Navigators Challenge.

This event was a Young Enterprise Scheme (YES) initiative designed to 'empower young indigenous leaders of Aotearoa to celebrate and harness their cultural heritage as they grow into the future decisionmakers of New Zealand'.

During the three-day event, under the guidance of business mentors, our students embarked on a fast-paced entrepreneurial journey of leadership, connection and collaboration to find innovative solutions to real world business challenges, like building a resilient food system for our whānau. They were divided into groups of six to tackle food insecurity using the power of technology.

On Day One participants met up and took part in some workshops at Deloitte. On Day Two they were put into teams and given the problem, and then had one day to come up with a solution and make business plans and pitches. On Day Three, they presented their solutions to a judging panel.

Rimu Frandi's group was judged the winners of the challenge, and she said, "Young Navigators was an amazing opportunity to learn more about leadership and connections within a business. During this three-day experience, I developed many strong skills for my future, with my business group winning the challenge and getting acceptance to EIA (Entrepreneur's in Action) in July."

Health and PE

Three Year 12 students – Izzy Angove, Georgia Derham and Hargun Aujla - chose as part of their Level 2 Health assessment to focus on men's mental health.

Their goal has been to address stigma around men talking about mental health. They decided to ask Zane Munro, Izzy's uncle, to come in and speak to Year 12 and 13 boys on this topic in May.

Zane founded and runs For All the Brothers, a group dedicated to supporting men's mental health. His messaging reaches over 40,000 followers on Instagram and they run weekly meetings in central Auckland.

Zane has been nominated for KiwiBank New Zealander of the Year and has won the Local Hero award in West Auckland. He has a meeting room named after him in the Kiwibank branch in New Lynn. Zane regularly speaks at the Arepa Brothers Brain Chat events.

Zane shared his story with our boys about getting help for his mental health, including talking about his journey with loneliness, depression, and feeling isolated and not knowing how to ask for help.

He talked about setting up For All the Brothers and how he wants our young men to grow up knowing it's okay to go through these things and to reach out to each other and find someone to talk to.

On the same day, former Silver Fern Sulu Fitzpatrick spoke to the Year 12 and 13 Girls about mental health and resilience.

Her netball career is highlighted by significant achievements, winning the ANZ Premiership with the Northern Mystics in 2021 and 2023, and being a key player for the Central Pulse during their championship seasons in 2018 and 2019.

But behind those achievements she was struggling with her self-worth and turned to food and alcohol to help her cope.

She spoke about her struggles growing up, being raised by other family members and never feeling like she was the same. She always worried about what others thought about her.

She reiterated that just because someone's life looks good on the outside it doesn't mean that's how they feel on the inside.

Sulu fell pregnant with twins at 21 and had to balance that on top of her netball





career. Her main message was about finding out who you really are and how, once she did that, not only did she begin to play better netball but she was also a better wife, mother and friend.

The Health Expo in May drew hundreds of students into the F.W. Gamble Hall to learn about a range of issues at stalls set up by Year 12 Health students.

The expo was run across lunchtimes with topics covered including mental health, good nutrition, creating positive relationships, dealing with sexuality, body image or depression; and awareness of the effects of vaping, drugs and alcohol. The Year 12s are working towards an achievement standard, which is a health promotion assignment.

Students have had to identify a health issue in the MAGS community, research the topic, develop resources, present their expo and then evaluate the effectiveness of it. This is giving the students first-hand experience of how health promotion works.

Year 13 Physical Education students completed the annual MAGS Aquathon in late June.


They swam 400m in the Mount Albert Pool,



Our garment's wings are made from hundreds of recycled paper feathers stuck onto recycled cardboard bases, the bodice made from recycled cardboard layered with repurposed fabric and faux feathers. The skirt is also made from repurposed fabric."



MAGS Drama had another sold-out season for a production – this time with Level 3 Drama undertaking the mammoth story of *12 Angry Men* on June 6 and 7.




















Focus on Shakespeare


Thirdly, MAGS was awarded the prize of 'Best Work of an Ensemble', which went to an excerpt from *Hamlet* directed by Miss Hughes.



ASB MAGS FARM

The ASB MAGS Farm has been quietly ticking along with new facilities having been developed for our hens. If we put another henhouse in, we could effectively house up to 100 layers.

September planting of a low lavender hedge will take place up the side of the hen facility. This will offer shelter, be a great food source for bees, and be far more aesthetically pleasing up the drive than the current old fence.

I have been working on putting an irrigation system in to the old hydroponics shed and we will now be able to utilise this more for growing out-of-season and rare/heritage types of plants.

We have had the ACES students on farm doing various projects. As a result, we have some great signage around the farm cleverly crafted by the ACES students.

The first round of lambing has just finished with a 200% lambing percentage. We have another round of lambing due over late August through to end of September with quads pregnancy scanned in some ewes! The aim is for ram lambs to hit the Xmas lamb market offering income for the farm.

The ewes and rams have all been shorn with some students coming along to have a go at shearing and also witness the pregnancy scanning of the ewes and pre-lambing vaccinations.

Our first couple of ewes are in and milking and there are no problems with the new milking shed and machinery. As lambs are weaned, more ewes will come on board.

The milk has been used to make soaps and lotions which are really nice products. It is hoped to involve non Ag students to design labelling and brand names for our products along with marketing ideas.

There have been issues with major water leaks due to an aging pipeline and old troughs. This will be addressed in the summer when new troughs can be correctly bedded down and balanced. In the meantime, leaky lines are cut off as they are found.

Calves are growing well and are now well weaned and being grown for sale in January/February.

August will see the first round of preparation for sunflower planting.

MAGS YEARS AGO

In New Zealand, 1974 is remembered for the Christchurch Commonwealth Games ("The Friendly Games") and the introduction of colour television.

The New Zealand Cricket team defeated Australia for the first time and the All Blacks had a short unbeaten tour of England, Ireland and Wales. The year was marred by the death of the Prime Minister, Norman Kirk, in August.


The nature of Mount Albert Grammar was changing slowly in 1974. Classes were no longer called 3A, 3B etc. but in the junior school, at least, classes were still streamed rigidly and students were promoted or demoted according to their performance in the school exams.

For several years Form Seven students had been allowed to wear mufti, and photographs from that year show that long hair styles were becoming the norm. Most teachers still called their students by their surnames but a small number were happy to use given names and within a few years this was the norm for most teachers. Corporal punishment was still a feature of school life though its use was diminishing as pressure for it to be banned increased.

The arrival of large numbers of immigrants from the Pacific Islands changed the ethnic makeup of the school







The school had success in sport. In Football, one team won the championship, one was runner-up and a third second in zone. Cricket produced two teams which won their championships and one runnerup. Rugby was the most successful sport with the 1st XV winning the championship for the second year in a row and two other teams were runners-up. For the first time there was a competition for students from the third and fourth form (years 9 and 10) which had no weight restriction. This competition was soon to become the Under 15 Colts competition. The Mount Albert team was undefeated over 10 games.

The school roll in 1974 was 1169 and most classes had more than 30 students. A number had as many as 38. The headmaster was Maurice Hall and

his deputy was Bill Heron. There were 57 teachers on the staff, which included for the first time a Guidance Counsellor. The non-teaching staff numbered eight.

A smaller roll required fewer buildings. The current library block was built in 1977. On this site in 1974 was an old wooden building housing a prefects' room, the tuck shop and a covered area for students to shelter. The library was on the second floor next to what is now the conference room. The learning support centre was the gymnasium and it was not until 1984 that a full-sized gymnasium was open. Where the pool carpark is now was the tennis courts, and the playing fields were much more extensive and would remain so until the increase in roll that started just before the new millennium.

The hall was still big enough to accommodate the whole school and each day began with an assembly.

There were seven periods every day and period changes were signalled by the ringing of the old school bell, which is still in the quadrangle.
