In 1926, foundation headmaster Fred Gamble convinced the Board of Governors of the time to purchase a large villa on New North Road, pictured on opposite page, for use as a hostel for boys from outside the school zone. Barely five years into its existence, MAGS was already facing high demand from boys and families across Auckland and beyond who wished to attend Mount Albert Grammar School (sounds familiar!). The original School House opened with 22 boys in 1927 before today's purpose-built facility, pictured above, was constructed on the school grounds in the early 1970s.

was the success of our boys' boarding facility which provided the impetus for the Board in 2017 to purchase a building a short walk from school, to house our first female boarders. After navigating the challenges of the Covid era, our Centenary year in 2022 finally saw that vision brought to life with the opening of Centennial House - a hostel for MAGS girls.

With those foundation girls joining Centennial House, MAGS became the only state co-educational school in New Zealand to offer boarding for both boys and girls. This unique point of difference has

> been welcomed by parents from outside of Auckland, with many of them now able to send both their sons and daughters to MAGS. It has been another important step in providing equity of opportunity for both the boys and girls of MAGS.

The front cover is graced with the photo of the Head Prefects of both School House - Hokioramai Dunn - and Centennial House - Phonephimonh Monh Sabanhdit. Hoki and Mon have enjoyed stellar careers here at MAGS and they are destined for great things in the future. In many ways they epitomise the MAGS graduate we are trying to produce – young men and women who understand service, have high personal aspirations while understanding the obligations to their fellow students and school. Both Hoki and Mon

will leave MAGS this year confident in their own skin. Their time as boarders in their 'home away from home' has nurtured this journey. They and their fellow boarders are forever part of the MAGS 'house' family!

Thank you to our boarding staff who, under the guidance of Director Daryl Cartwright, create such a positive cultural epicentre of

And thank you to the parents who entrust their already good sons and daughters to MAGS, and allow us to grow them into great young men and women.

BOARDING at IVAGS



One hundred years ago, MAGS first Headmaster, FW Gamble, saw the wisdom of creating boarding facilities for students.

In his first annual report in 1922 he noted that "frequent inquiries for boarding accommodation emphasise one of Auckland's greatest liabilities – possessing no institution to receive children of outlying districts who have earned and desire the right to be taught in a Grammar School".

In 1926 a large house at 807 New North Road was bought from the Child Welfare Department. It had been built 43 years earlier as a gentleman's residence on more than 2.2ha of land, running the length of Burch Street through to Asquith Avenue and occupying half the block. After some refurbishment it opened in 1927 as the Mount Albert Grammar School Hostel with 22 boys. In the following years the numbers almost doubled.

The original School House closed in 1970. The new School House, built on the school's lower hockey field, was up and running in 1971. It accommodates 110 boys and is always in huge demand.

When MAGS welcomed girls in 2000, there was no boarding facility for female students until last year, our Centenary year, when Centennial House opened and was able to accommodate up to 25 girls.

Director of Boarding Daryl Cartwright said Gamble's vision has been borne out by the demand from students further afield to board at MAGS.

"Many boys from outside of Auckland choose to board at School House to be able to gain an excellent educational experience at our school. The school board and current Headmaster Mr Drumm wanted to be able to offer the same opportunity to girls and Centennial House was opened last year in the school's 100th year.

"Boarding at MAGS aims to offer a safe, caring, and nurturing home away from home. School House and Centennial House allow students from outside the Mount Albert Grammar School zone to access a quality education rich in tradition and one that promotes high standards. Students not only have the opportunity to access many areas of the wider school life, but they also make significant contributions.

"We strive to always provide an environment that helps students grow emotionally, physically and spiritually into mature young people and leaders of tomorrow.

"Living at School House and Centennial House is about maximising opportunities for leadership and participation. The culture aims to allow each student to realise there potential through personal growth where they develop a sense of independence, learn to manage the challenges of communal living and foster lifelong friendships."

Mr Cartwright enjoys the challenge of working with young people in boarding.

"It is not an easy thing to leave your family and friends to go to school. The teenagers we get to work with develop resilience and independence by leaving home and choosing to go into boarding. It is a significant responsibility that parents entrust us to care for their children; it is a key part of the role that we take very seriously.

"Seeing the change and growth in each of our boarders as they mature is rewarding. There is a real sense of pride in seeing our boarders grow into confident young adults; sometimes they can be a totally different person compared to when they began their journey at MAGS. The significant achievements and contributions that so many make to the school is also inspirational.

"As the Director of Boarding, I certainly can have a variety of challenges, but the aim is to always provide the best experience we can for our young people. I believe there are five fundamental qualities that make every team great, and these qualities are what we aim for everyday as a staff and for the students to develop over time here at School House and Centennial House.

These are: Communication, Trust, Collective Responsibility, Caring and Pride."







Centennial House Manager Karen Kidd said, "Centennial House offers an excellent opportunity for young girls to enrol into Mount Albert Grammar School, where they can fully engage in a wide range of sports, academic and cultural activities.

"Within the secure and welcoming environment of Centennial House, the girls not only feel safe but also have clear support systems in place to address their pastoral needs. The house encourages the development of positive daily routines, fostering independence and self-management skills over time.

Mrs Kidd adds, "It's rewarding watching the girls' growth, their bonding, and the development of strong relationships. It's enjoyable watching them enjoying their sports, academics, and cultural pursuits, all while building valuable life skills for when they leave Centennial House."

Debating

Both of our debating teams, who made it into the Octofinals, have continued to impress.

The Senior Open team made up of Ryan Antia, Nishka Arora and Arshiya Arora (pictured top right with Mr Ploeg), made it through to the Quarterfinals, and Ryan Antia was awarded the 6th Best Speaker award at the ASD prizegiving at St Kentigern College.

Our Junior Open team of Stephanie Zhang, Eliza Rodger, Isabella Caie, Sona McCormack and Lachlan Paul (pictured right with Ms Laxon) progressed right through to the final, which was held at MAGS in Spetember, and came second out of 106 teams across Auckland.

TIC Debating Mr Ploeg said, "This was an extremely impressive achievement. The chief moderator commented that the debate was one of the best Junior Open debates he had ever seen.

Furthermore, Stephanie Zhang and Isabella Caie were awarded 5th and 9th Best Speaker awards respectively. Their congratulation are well-deserved.

"This concludes a very successful year in debating, and highlights the quality of our students, who have conducted themselves to the highest of standards."







BIOLOGY Olympiad

Jacob Miller (pictured left on arrival home) was part of the medal-winning New Zealand team who competed at the 34th International Biology Olympiad (IBO), in the United Arab Emirates in August.

Jacob, who won a silver medal, which is a first for MAGS, went one better than last year when he won bronze.

He was part of a NZ team that achieved international success against 1000 students from 80 countries. Jacob was one of two New Zealand students who were awarded silver medals, with the other two in the team claiming bronze.

Reflecting on the success of students at the IBO, NZIBO Chair Dr Angela Sharples said: "The ambitious target for New Zealand is for our students to compete against the best young scientists in the world and bring home both the medals and a lifelong passion for the biological sciences that will grow science research and innovation in NZ. To win four medals is an outstanding achievement by our students. They are truly among the best young scientists in the world."

REMEMBERING — Soren Wislang

On October 11, MAGS unveiled a plaque in memory of Mathematics and Statistics teacher Soren Wislang, who passed away early in 2022, aged 55 years.

It was a privilege to have members of Soren's family – his mother Helen, wife Diana and daughters Hannah and Kate (pictured right) – at the ceremony, which was also attended by Soren's colleagues and past students in the F.W. Gamble Hall.

Headmaster Mr Drumm said it was fitting that Soren now had a permanent place at MAGS where he would forever be remembered as "a passionate, creative educator and talented musician".

He said, "It is really special to honour Soren (pictured left) and his family today. His name as a permanent fixture in our hall will mark that legacy – as will the Soren Wislang Cup for Year 12 Statistics accompanied by a financial award – which Diana, Hannah and Kate have kindly donated to the school – and which was presented for the first time at last year's Senior Prizegiving.

"Soren represents all that is good about a MAGS teacher."

Colleague Mr Walden paid tribute to Soren's upbeat nature, work ethic, organisational skills and dedication to his students.

He said Soren had poured huge amounts of energy into creating outstanding coursework that would be part of his legacy at MAGS.

Soren's wife Diana said she was surprised and touched by MAGS' tribute to her husband, who was a passionate and incredibly dedicated teacher who could only be pried away from his work and hours of research by taking him away on holiday. She said Soren loved the camaraderie of his fellow teachers and seeing his students excel.

In his four years at MAGS, Soren also supported the choral and orchestral programmes, and managed tennis, table tennis and football teams. He also played bass in the staff band MAGnitude, which reformed to pay tribute to him.

Mr Walden (drums), Mr Watson (guitar), Miss Hughes (vocals) and Mr Knowles (guitar and vocals) entertained guests with a medley of songs to wrap up the ceremony.

CAREERS AND PATHWAYS


The 2023 Careers and Pathways Expo held on July 25 in the MH Block was a huge success with a record turnout.

MAGS students shone at the Goethe Society Orals competition in August.


Year 9 Pari Lohar claimed bronze, Year 10

Mathematics teacher Mr Walden said, "In 2023, 69 schools across the country participated, with 184 teams and 203 individuals (around 700 students total) so these are tremendous achievements."

Anatol Coen, Jacob Miller, Ryan Shen and Victor Coen received an Honourable Mention upon completion of judging in the International Maths Modelling Challenge.

They were competing against teams from around the world after their solution



had been judged as one of the top two entries from New Zealand.

The problem they worked on for five days straight was to come up with mathematical models to determine the best use for a specific plot of land in the vicinity of New York that factored in variables such as "geography, climate, business options, community needs and local culture".

In the Otago Junior Maths
Competition, our students returned some excellent results.

SCIENCE

On August 21, MAGS sent two Junior and two Senior teams to the annual Science Bowl held at Auckland Grammar, competing against the best science students across a select number of schools in Auckland.

Our Senior 1 team made up of Year 12 students Jacob Miller, Samuel Reeves, Eric Hu and Jonathon Yu (pictured right) competed well in the round robin and qualified for the semi-finals against a strong Year 13 Macleans College team. They decisively won that semi-final and progressed to the final against another Year 13 team from Kristen School.

TIC Mr Huang said, "The MAGS boys showed composure and held their nerve to take out their competition with a fantastic win, with 170 points for MAGS over 100 points for Kristen."

One of our Junior teams also made it to the semi-final rounds. The Junior 1 team of Parth Setiya, Isabella Caie and Campbell Buchanan were the only Junior team with just three members, putting them at a disadvantage.

Despite this, the team managed to get to the semi-final rounds only to be knocked out by a very strong Year 11 Auckland



Grammar team. Special mention to Isabella Caie for being the only Year 10 in the team and showing outstanding knowledge and contribution to their success.

Participants were also invited to attend workshops at Te Papa run by recognised Māori artists and given a 'behind the scenes' tour of Te Papa.











EDDIE MULIAUMASEALI'I (1979-1983)

A career operatic bass for over 35 years, Eddie Muliaumaseali'i has performed all around the world, singing Mozart, Puccini, Verdi and Rossini, as well as modern composers.

Eddie recounts how his career got started at MAGS:

"In 1981, Mr Roy Clements came to our classroom to speak to our teacher, Mr Desmond Coles. It was after lunch in Period 4 and Mr Coles was at his wits' end trying to get us to read John Steinbeck's *Of Mice and Men* aloud.

He was saved by Mr Clements. There was a shortage of singers for the *Pirates of Penzance*. Mr Coles said to us, "Do any of you boys want to be in the school musical". He was met with a silence until he said, "It's during class time", at which point half the class stood up and followed Mr Clements to the music room.

Thus the Polynesian arm of the Policemen's chorus arrived in Miss Tresedar's class. Already there were other misfits and rogue teenagers that had been roped into doing the show. This was due to the fact that the usual students who wanted to be in the musical, including my brother Sani, were already in the show but they needed more students. Houseboys were also pressganged into show.

As fate would have it, my dear friend
Stephen Nash decided that 1st XI Hockey
was more important than rehearsal. Mr
Clements, always a man of peace, completely
lost it when he was told that Stephen, who
was singing the role of the Sergeant of Police,
wasn't available. He then turned to us and
said, "Who has a low voice and wants to sing
Stephen's part for rehearsal?"

When none of the boys volunteered, Gary Opetaia and Sofi Pua pushed me forward and said, "Eddie can Sir, he can sing it." I did such a good job that they gave me a performance.

It was the Thursday night show at the Mount Albert War Memorial Hall . I then went on to do the musicals in 1982, 1983 and 1984, playing the lead role in *South Pacific*, Koko in *The Mikado* and the Usher in *Trial By Jury*.

Forty years on, I am a professional opera singer. I have been singing in operas, musical theatre, session singing for recording studios, back-up vocals on rock tours, acted in TV shows like *Shortland Street* and dramatic plays, and sung in concerts with orchestras. This has taken to cities all over the world.

The tale of my first experience of performing in musicals is a result of chance. Had Mr Clements not come to see Mr Coles and if Stephen had opted to come to rehearsal thus denying me the chance of singing a solo role, I may not have continued my involvement in the arts.

My focus was rugby and I captained my team at Ponsonby as a 19-year-old, played for Auckland under 20s and then my brother Sani said there was an audition at Mercury Theatre in 1987. We both got in and I have been in the Arts ever since.

Coming to Mags in 1979, I had no interest in the Arts. A series of events eventually led me to be part of the wonderful world of music. It gave me a community of which I have been part of since. The community of the Arts that is service to life.

So many of us as young students didn't really have set courses or goals coming into high school. Many of us just liked "hanging out" with our friends and having fun and a good laugh.



The Headmaster, DP and staff created an environment in this era that allowed us to really excel in either academia, sports or the arts but most importantly, have a very strong school spirit. A spirit where we looked out for each other as students no matter what your school affiliation was or age, you were a MAGS boy and that was enough.

I am grateful to the teachers who were strong and strict with my mob of rogues and outliers, and to the teachers who saw through the facade of teenage bravado and tomfoolery and gave us a break and encouraged our potential."



LUCY LYNCH (2004-2008)

Lucy Lynch is an Auckland-based multidisciplinary artist.

We celebrated Lucy in our *The Lion*December 2019 edition when she was
working as a featured dancer with the New
Zealand Dance Company.

Lucy danced in the majority of the company's major seasons throughout Aotearoa and has toured to some of the world's most prestigious dance festivals in Australia, Germany, Belgium, Luxembourg and The Netherlands.

Lucy is now involved in many aspects of the performance industry in NZ. Alongside her contemporary practice, she works for commercial dance company Diamond Entertainment, and is a burlesque artist and resident performer at the acclaimed cabaret show Club Burlesque.

She has just finished performing the lead of Giselle in Mary Jane O'Reilly's contemporary ballet and touring Ross McCormack's work *Artefact* with The New Zealand Dance Company.



JOSH CESAN (2006-2010)

Celebrated dancer and choreographer

BENJAMIN SINCLAIR (2002-2005)



Marnie and Marlin Toloa , pictured below right, claimed gold and silver medals respectively representing Aotearoa New Zealand in Waka Ama at the IVF World Long Distance Championships in Samoa in August.

They both competed in the U16s V6 ocean race, which was 16km.

Teams came from far and wide, including the Pacific Islands, Australia, Chile, Brazil, USA, Hawaii, Germany, Great Britain, Canada, Singapore and Hong Kong to compete on Apia Harbour.

The U16 Girls endured the worst start possible after getting caught in a crosswind and being tangled in the start buoy. By the time they cleared the buoy, the rest of the field had a 150m headstart. The girls kept their composure and went on to execute their race plan and started overtaking teams.

They came home several minutes ahead of second-placed Samoa to take the gold medal and world championship title.

The U16 Boys also raced the same day and were in a very fast field. The boys worked hard off the start line and were just in front of Tahiti heading out of the harbour. The boys also executed their race strategy well with downwind surfing but were passed by a very slick Tahitian team. They fought hard to stay with the Tahitians and see off any challenges from other teams. They claimed the silver medal behind Tahiti, with Samoa coming third.











WINTER' TOURNA

Many of our teams made it to the finals of their Winter Tournament Week competitions but none of them could clear the final hurdle to become champions.

But in Wrestling, Max Shallard, Sean
Harding and Jason Vincent broke through
to win gold in the Senior Boys' Under 60
kg, Under 65kg and Under 110kg sections
respectively. Max was also named the Senior
Boys Most Scientific Wrestler. Aiden Vincent
claimed silver in the Junior Boys Under 68kg
section, and Caleb Murphy finished sixth in
the Junior Boys Under 80kg section.

Our Basketball Premier Boys and Girls both finished as runners-up at regionals, with the girls losing 61-90 to Westlake Girls High. The Boys faced Rosmini in the final, after recently beating them to become Auckland champions, but couldn't repeat those heroics, going down 51-66. Earlier in the week, our Basketball Junior Girls and Boys teams finished third and sixth respectively in their regional tournament.

Playing in the Hawkes Bay, the Hockey Boys 1st XI fell just short – losing their NZSS Final 3-4 against Hastings Boys High. Our Hockey Girls 1st XI also lost in their NZSS Final, going down 1-2 to Whanganui Collegiate

The Football Girls 1st XI finished third in their NZSS competition after beating

Westlake Girls High 4-0, while the Boys lost their 3rd/4th playoff against St Kentigern after drawing 2-2 then losing on penalties.

At Paradice Avondale, our Curling team finished second at NISS, going down 4-11 to Lynfield College in the final.

In Weightlifting, Eli Harford-Lewis, our sole lifter, came second in the Senior Boys 102 kg-plus category at the NZSS Nationals.

In their NZSS semifinal, the Rugby Girls 1st XV lost 5-28 to Hamilton Girls High and then lost the third/fourth playoff on Sunday against Christchurch Girls High 5-15.

Playing at UNISS in Hamilton, our Netball Premiers won their first five games but then faltered before beating Waitakere College 48-36 in their last game to finish fifth.

Two good wins saw the Lacrosse Premier Girls start their NZSS competition well at Cornwall Park but they could not maintain that momentum and ended up finishing fourth.

Our Rugby League 1st XIII made it to the NZSS Plate Final but lost that to Kelston Boys High 12-32.

The Rugby U15s finished 13th in their National Invitational Tournament in Hamilton after beating St Bede's College 26-22 in their last game.

In Underwater Hockey, our Junior Open team played in the NZSS tournament at

Westwave, and won their last game 6-1 against Mahurangi College to finish third.

At the NZSS Fencing championships in Wellington, Lize Deng won bronze in the Boys Epee, with Lawrence Zhao seventh.

Theo Bray competed in Cycling's NZSS Northern Tour in Mt Wellington, finishing the hill climb on Day One in 12th. On Day Two, in the Criterium, he was ranked into the U17 A race but was lapped and had to retire.






















Lots has been happening on-farm. The weather has not been our friend, but we are finally getting there.
Paddocks up the back have been topped,

harrowed and limed. Weeds have also been sprayed and after the third mow, I have noticed some of the good pasture grasses starting to come through and the kikuyu starting to lessen in those areas.

I have been working closely with our digger man, Paul Hale, who has been an absolute godsend. We had paddocks under water with blocked and inefficient drainage that have now been cleared. We have fenced off the permanently low-lying wet areas where drains will collapse causing problems if stock are allowed to trample them. We will plant those areas out in either natives or Tagasaste – a tree lucerne – that is great for the soil and can also be used for stock feed if times get tough (in a drought).

You may have noticed spraying occurring in the paddock by the school/farm drive. We are going to be planting this paddock into sunflowers, which will not only generate a very good income stream but will also regenerate the soil allowing us to follow with good pasture species to replace the kikuyu. Depending on the success of this, we will move along the paddocks each year as we renovate our pastures. "The Good Oil" company is on board with us on this project.











All stock has been drenched and vaccinated and we have our first Suffolk lambs finally on the ground. We also have our very first MAGSLAND East Friesian lambs being born now.

We have had Sethu from Groplus in to advise on the Kiwifruit block which has had PSA – a disease of kiwifruit. The whole Kiwifruit had not been pruned correctly in the past, so we are now on par for best practice in getting the block healthy and up to speed. We had soil tests done and these showed excessive nitrogen use in the kiwifruit – despite the wet this showed levels three times that of the maximum recommended levels. We are working with Groplus to get this right and will also be replacing any diseased or dead plants with new root stock and developing a full canopy as well.

We have started developing the races on farm so we can get to the stage where the students can easily move stock or bring them in as necessary.

Horticulture has had a massive clean-up which is ongoing, and we will continue to be committed to developing this part of the farm enterprise. We have done a lot of citrus pruning on specialist advice of the correct

way to prune these and hope to see much better plant health as a result in the future. We have the framework for a new vertical garden in place and are going to have both the irrigation system, which has electrical wires travelling under water, and the hydroponic shed revamped.

The pullets are laying well, and we are hoping to get the enclosure extension finished during the Christmas holidays, along with finishing the new fences. We are redoing the internal fences as the old ones were not functional. We have managed to repurpose most posts and gates already on farm for this.

I have made the decision not to rear spring calves this year. The prices at sale in comparison to rising costs of feed and milk powder, makes spring calves this year not economically viable. We are also predicted to be heading into an extremely dry summer so this could well cause a few farmers to destock early rather than buy in and accordingly affect the ability to sell or sell at the kind of margin we need.

Due to this, at this stage, I will continue to look at rearing Autumn calves and see how this goes sales-wise into next year.

Our milk vending machine and bottle dispenser have arrived, but we are stagnating

over our milking plant. The plant we are waiting on is still sitting overseas due to high clearance costs at the other end so if we are not up and running by the time the hoggets lamb, the lambs will just stay on their mums until we are set up. As the whole plant new is under \$4000 and other outfits in NZ have quoted from \$8000 up for similar units, I am at this stage happy to wait. Our big-ticket item will be the required head bails which currently are sitting around \$10,000 so I am just waiting for a secondhand set to come on the market and get a better price point.

School holidays has been a time of renewing old fences and I have most of the paddocks up the back where we held The Clash event re-fenced and looking nice. We have the CEO of Gallaghers coming to view progress. Hopefully he will be impressed enough to give us some funding to continue to develop the farm into a place to be proud of.

DR MOLLY SWANSON AND JAMIE HUCKLESBY

Congratulations to two Albertians – Dr Molly Swanson (2007-2011) and Jamie Hucklesby (2011-2013) - who have received generous fellowships from the Neurological Foundation of NZ to continue their research.

Molly, a research fellow at University of Auckland, has received a \$245,052 Philip Wrightson Fellowship for her ongoing research into amyotrophic lateral sclerosis (ALS), a paralysing brain and spinal cord disease caused by the death of neurons involved in movement.

She'll travel to Australia to learn new techniques for working with microglia – brain immune cells that help the brain recover from damage and disease. She's also been awarded a \$15,000 small project grant to establish new microglia technology in NZ.

Jamie, also at University of Auckland, received a \$231,553 First Fellowship for his ongoing research

He will use human brain cells to determine if the window for effective treatment after stroke can be extended, and if other medications could be combined with current stroke treatments to protect the brain and improve outcomes.

From the Archives

Many of the prizes awarded recently at prizegivings were originally presented by people who have been very important in the development of Mount Albert Grammar School. Here is a very small sample.

THE F.W. GAMBLE MEMORIAL CUP FOR THE BEST ALL ROUND YEAR 13 BOY

F.W. Gamble was the first headmaster of Mount Albert Grammar School. He was appointed in 1921 and oversaw the first years of the school during which many of the traditions that are still followed today were developed.

He had the difficult task of seeing the school through the war years and retired at the end of 1946. Sadly, his retirement was a short one

His funeral was held in the school hall, and Alberton
Avenue was lined with students as the cortege left the school.
The prefects of 1949 were present at his funeral

They held a 40th reunion in 1989 and decided to present to the school this trophy. Since 2004 it has been awarded to the best all round boy and has often (but not always) been presented to the Head Prefect. It recognises a student who has made an outstanding contribution to the school in a number of areas – academic, sport, the arts and service. This year's recipient is Head Prefect Taiarahia Moata'ane-Mika.

THE MOUNT ALBERT GRAMMAR SCHOOL TROPHY FOR THE BEST ALL ROUND YEAR 13 GIRL

Girls first attended Mount Alber Grammar in 2000, and in 2003 five girls from Year 12 were appointed as prefects.

This was the last year that Year 12 students served as





prefects and these girls formed the core of the prefects of 2004. Sosefina Fa'mausilii was the first head girl prefect. This group of prefects, like their counterparts of 1949 presented a trophy which is awarded to the best all round girl. The criteria for this award are the same as the

VICTOR LUDORUM

Victor Ludorum is Latin for "winner of the games" and is presented to the student considered to have made the greatest contribution across a variety of sports.

The victor ludorum trophy was presented by the Auckland Grammar School Old Boys' Football Club in 1922 and named the Senior Athletics Championship Cup.

Unusually, it was repurposed in 1945 and renamed the Victor Ludorum Cup. A number of the recipients have gone on to very successful careers in their chosen sport.

VICTRIX LUDORUM

In 2004 the then headmaster
Greg Taylor presented a trophy
as the girls' equivalent of
the Victor Ludorum. The first
recipient was Casey Boxall,
whose father had attended the
school in the 1960s. Her two
brothers, Michael and Nico,
also attended the school and
went on to successful careers in
football. Portia Woodman, who
is a member of the current Black

This year's Victrix Ludorum is Anika Todd for her achievements in Cricket, Athletics, Football, Lawn Bow and Curling.

HL TOWERS

H.L. Towers, more commonly known as "Herb", was a foundation master at the school and his career lasted from 1922 until 1978. He was best known as a Mathematics teacher but halso served as deputy principal from 1959 to 1960.

He was the first housemaster when School House opened in 1927 and was a successful rugby coach for a number of years. He was responsible for setting up the inter-secondary schools athletics competitions in 1928 and was involved in athletics right up to just before his death in 1994.

In 1979 a number of his former students who had made their careers in Mathematics or related fields donated to a trust fund for the H.L. Towers

These awards are given annually to the top mathematics students in years 10, 11 and 12. The year 10 award is yet to be announced but the two winners for 2023 are Ava Poynter (Year 11) and Jacob Miller (Year 12).


CALDER HISTORY PRIZE


This prize is awarded to the top student in Year 13 History. H.L. Calder was a popular history teacher who taught at Mount Albert Grammar from 1923 to 1967

He was also senior Housemaster from 1930 to 1934 When he retired in 1967, Jaz, as he was popularly known, donated money to the school to be used as a prize for the top history student in what was then known as 6A.

A number of his students enjoyed successful careers as historians, perhaps the most notable Professors Keith Sinclair and Russell Stone, along with Doctor Michael Bassett.


